

TOWN CLERK NEWS

Just a reminder that unless you qualify for a permanent absentee ballot, your application is only valid for all elections in one (1) calendar year. If you filed an application in 2017, it has expired. The Primary is September 4 and the State Election is November 6. It's not too early to file an absentee application. Early voting is during the business hours of the Town Clerk. More information to come on early voting.

I'm still working on the certification of Town Meeting but 281 voters checked in on May 14 and 150 voters on May 17. The voters rejected the motion to authorize the Board of Selectmen to petition the General Court for the enactment of special legislation that would allow for the issuance of not more than one alcoholic beverage license for on-premises consumption (pouring) under Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 138, Section 12. An amendment to the Zoning bylaw to adopt a new Town Center District also failed 75-53. Voters approved to accept the Nashua, Squannacook and Nissitissit Rivers Stewardship plan developed by the Nashua River Wild and Scenic River Study and also a conservation restriction on the Frye property contingent upon receiving a self-help grant. Also approved was the purchase by way of a debt exclusion for a fire truck and to purchase the Dumont property on Lowell Street, both contingent on an affirmative vote at the special election on June 26. Also approved and contingent on the ballot was adopting a new section to Regulate Recreational Marijuana Establishments.

The Annual Town Election results are now certified and online under "Election Results". Moving the election day to Tuesday did not cause any confusion! There were 576 ballots cast representing a 24% voter turnout.

Nomination papers are now available at my office for the position of Greater Lowell Regional School Committee representative. This is a result of a court ruling from a lawsuit filed against the Towns of Dunstable, Dracut and Tyngsboro by the City of Lowell, we will elect our Greater Lowell Regional School Committee members for a 4-year term on the November state election ballot. Candidates must submit nomination papers to this office for certification no later than 5:00 pm on Tuesday, July 24, 2018. You must be a registered voter.

WHY DON'T WE PLAN FOR THE FUTURE?

Many of us fail to plan for the future. Why is that? We know bad things may happen and we should plan for them, but we don't get the job done? You know that you should engage in Estate Planning, Retirement Planning and Planning for disability, but you don't. It helps to understand why, so you can overcome those obstacles.

People generally only thing about things that are right in front of them and are either new or urgent in some way, or strike some emotional reaction. Thus we will fall prey to things like the smell of fried food or a sign for ice cream. They are right there in front of us, we feel hungry right now and the smells or sights hit a positive emotional button. Long term planning for retirement or death are far away and unpleasant and have negative emotional feelings. It's only natural to put off those things that are unpleasant.

Sometimes there might be an event that triggers your need or desire to plan. If you had a death in the family or someone close went to a nursing home, then you suffered that immediate issue and saw new and urgent things that you may need to deal with yourself someday. I often get new clients because the problems of a friend or family member made the need immediate and urgent for the person who came to see me.

When planning for aging or disability, the event seems remote and unlikely, so it is harder to envision. There are also negative emotional triggers when thinking about this, so it's easy to try to avoid it. But, if you want to live well into your elder years then you do need to plan. You should think about some key questions to start thinking about what you want. One might be that fried food or ice cream. Who will you be with when eating that fried food, or if you cannot go out for ice cream, who will be the one who will go get it for you? If you are home alone, will someone be coming by to help you with things like household chores? Who will that be, and if it is a professional, how will you pay them?

Thinking about these issues and others like them may make future planning more relevant and urgent. You may need to save more in order to pay for help around the house. Or, you may need to set up planning tools like Trusts and Powers of Attorney. You may need to cultivate a network of friends and professionals who will be there when you need them. This all means you need to think about how you would like your future to be, and then you need to visit your financial planner and your Elder Law Attorney to try to set up systems that will make sure your wishes do come true.

MIDDLESEX SHERIFF'S OFFICE ALERTS RESIDENTS TO RECENT INCREASE IN JURY DUTY SCAMS

MEDFORD, Mass. – The Middlesex Sheriff's Office (MSO) is warning residents today of a new round of scam calls threatening citizens with arrest for failing to appear for jury and/or grand jury service. The MSO has been made aware of dozens of scam calls made to Middlesex County residents over the past week. In one instance, a local resident lost in excess of \$1,500 believing the threats made by the scammers were real.

On these calls, scammers pose as members of the MSO or court staff. They falsely inform residents that they have missed jury duty and are subject to arrest unless they pay a fine. Frequently, the scammers will ask that residents pay this fine by purchasing a pre-paid debit or gift card and providing the scammer with the card's code. This allows them to utilize the funds on the card without a trace.

"Threatening arrest is a tactic used by these perpetrators to scare innocent residents," said Sheriff Peter J. Koutoujian. "We want everyone to be aware of these scams in order to better protect themselves. Never, under any circumstances, will law enforcement ask you to pay a fine through gift cards."

Anyone who may have received similar calls is encouraged to report them to their local police department and the MSO Digital Forensics Unit at 978-932-3292. They may also file a complaint online with the Federal Communications Commission using their <u>Consumer Complaint Center</u>.

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


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DUNSTABLE SENIORS

"OH WELL" VS. "I MUST ACT!"

Hezekiah and Josiah were both considered the best kings of Judah during the Divided Kingdom period of Israel's history (2 Kings 18.5, 23.25). They both were favorably compared to David, the godly founder of their dynasty. They both enacted radical reforms: restoring ancient worship practices that had long been neglected, smashing the idols and altars of false gods, and restoring and cleansing the temple complex. Despite the similarities they shared in devotion to the Lord, 2 Kings reveals drastic differences in their attitudes about the future of their country.

In 2 Kings 20, we read that Hezekiah became mortally ill and was told by the Lord to set his house in order to prepare for his impending death. After Hezekiah wept and prayed, however, the Lord granted him an extra fifteen years of life. Envoys from the nation of Babylon came to see the king with letters and a present because word of Hezekiah's sickness had spread far beyond Judah's borders. In a moment of prideful weakness, Hezekiah showed the envoys all of his wealth and treasure. When Isaiah the prophet confronted Hezekiah, he told the king that one day the Babylonians would come and empty Judah of its resources and people. We're told Hezekiah's surprising response in 2 Kings 20.19 when he said "'The word of the Lord that you have spoken is good.' For he thought, '*Why not, if there will be peace and security in my days*?'" In other words, "Oh well! It's not my problem."

Contrast this to Josiah's reaction to a message of coming catastrophe. Upon hearing the words of the lost book of the law, Josiah ripped his clothing, wept, and inquired of the Lord. God told him through a prophetess that Judah's days were numbered. However, because Josiah's heart was tender, he would experience peace in his lifetime and not see the approaching disaster. Instead of resting contentedly in his guaranteed safety, Josiah threw his nation into a time of frenzied spiritual restoration. He gathered the leaders of Judah and its people, renewed a covenant with the Lord at the temple, and began to do all he could to turn the hearts of his people back to their God. Not only did he cleanse Judah of idolatry, he also went north beyond the borders of his kingdom to cleanse the cities of Samaria as well! Instead of an "Oh well" response, he reacted to the future with an attitude of "I must act!"

Which king of Judah do you most resemble in your personal life? Are you mainly concerned with immediate peace, or do you take a keen interest in what will happen in future generations after you are gone? What kinds of spiritual foundations are you laying in your family and your local church? Are you content to simply sit back in the knowledge that you are walking with the Lord, or are you proactively helping others around you remove their idols? Are you Hezekiah or Josiah?

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HOW TO PAY FOR THERAPY OPTIONS, PROS AND CONS By Jan Price, LICSW & David Harrison, LICSW

The National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH), estimates that nearly 1 in 5 U.S. adults live with moderate to severe mental health issues. Though help is readily available, barriers remain to receiving good treatment. Geography, scheduling and social pressure to "tough it out" are among common stumbling blocks despite widespread agreement among researchers that Psychotherapy – "Talk Therapy" – can improve mental health outcomes. In addition, of course, are financial concerns. That is, though many clinicians don't like to talk about it, good therapy costs money.

Consumers of therapy should be aware of numerous financial and clinical considerations when faced with decisions regarding managed care, private pay, out of network, out of pocket, HMOs, PPOs, and CPTs plus diagnoses from the DSM-5 and the ICD-10... Confused yet? As with medical care, the jargon can seem overwhelming but psychotherapy often turns out to be more affordable than many people imagine. Understanding 3 basic choices will improve your chances of finding the help best suited to your individual needs: *Insurance – In Network.* As with more expensive medical services, many people seek to use insurance to cover the largest portion of psychotherapy's cost. Seeing someone "in network" means that you must see a therapist who has signed a service contract with your particular insurance company. Your cost for services, in the form of co-pays or full fee payments toward your plan's deductible is determined by your plan's "behavioral health benefits"

Insurance - Out of Network. Some insurance plans offer their subscribers Out of Network (OON) benefits for behavioral health. Often labelled "Preferred Provider Organizations" (PPO), these plans reimburse some portion of treatment cost (sometimes as much as 50%-60% – again subject to your plan's deductible) without any restrictions on who subscribers see for therapy. Your therapist does not have to be contracted with your insurance company in order for you to use your OON benefits.

Private Pay. Also known as "Out of Pocket", private pay refers to financial arrangements that don't involve insurance. Instead of a co-pay or partial reimbursement, consumers simply agree to a fee which they pay directly to their therapist at the time of service or according to an agreed upon billing schedule. It is worth noting that many therapists employ a "sliding scale" whereby they offer discounted fees to a limited number of private pay clients in need. And Psychotherapy qualifies for payment from Health Spending Accounts (HSA) and Flexible Spending Accounts (FSA) set up through employers.

So, why choose Private Pay for psychotherapy? First, because many experienced therapists will not contract with insurance companies, paying out of pocket increases your choices and your chances of finding the right therapist for you. In fact, Private Pay allows your treatment to be free of any interference from insurance companies, all of whom feel free to manage your care based on their own assessment of your individual needs. For instance, insurance companies dictate how often subscribers can be seen and reserve the right to decide for you when your therapy should end.

Insurance companies also demand that your clinician provide a mental health diagnosis for you, and your treatment plans and session notes may also be subject to insurers' review – after which all this very personal confidential information becomes a part of your permanent medical record. In this era of managed healthcare, many consumers are wary of insurers labeling any mental health need as a "pre-existing condition".

Again per NIMH, significantly less than half of those individuals with mental health conditions receive treatment during a given year despite the availability of help. But with or without using insurance of any kind, an hour of psychotherapy is surprisingly affordable. 
DUNSTABLE RESIDENT GRADUATES FROM THE ACADEMY

Tyngsboro, MA – On June 2, the Academy of Notre Dame held its 164th Upper School Commencement Ceremony. Among the students who received their diplomas from the private, all-girls Catholic high school in Tyngsboro, was a young woman from Dunstable. Isabella Hann participated in many activities and events at the Academy. She was active in the Mission and Ministry Core Team, Catholic Heart Work Camp, the Academy's newspaper, and the *Muse*, a student-run art magazine. Hann held a leadership role in the outreach program with St. Patrick's school her junior and senior year, as community service coordinator.

Since grade 5, Hann has been competitive in gymnastics and competes at the highest level in her division. She was recognized as Student of the Month in January 2017 and received the Ann Boumila Memorial Scholarship in May 2017. 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

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



BE SAFE WHEN THE TEMPERATURES SOAR: **RED CROSS ISSUES SAFETY TIPS FOR HOT** WEATHER

It's that time of year when the temperature goes up and heat and humidity, which can be deadly, make being outdoors very uncomfortable. According to the Centers for Disease Control(CDC), more than 600 people in the United States are killed by extreme heat every year. The American Red Cross has steps you can take to help stay safe when the temperatures soar. "It's important for everyone to realize that warm weather can be dangerous," said Holly Grant, regional chief executive officer of the American Red Cross of Massachusetts. "The Red Cross has steps you can follow to make sure you and your loved ones are protected when hot weather hits your area.

HEAT SAFETY TIPS Some people are more at risk of developing a heat-related illness, including adults age 65 and older, those with chronic medical conditions, people who work outside, infants and children and athletes. Here are steps you should take in hot weather: • Hot cars can be deadly. Never leave children or pets in your vehicle. The inside temperature of the car can quickly reach 120 degrees. • Stay hydrated by drinking plenty of fluids. Avoid drinks with caffeine or alcohol. . Check on family, friends and neighbors who do not have air conditioning, who spend much of their time alone or who are more likely to be affected by the heat. • If someone doesn't have air conditioning, they should seek relief from the heat during the warmest part of the day in places like schools, libraries, theaters, malls, etc. • Avoid extreme temperature changes. • Wear loose-fitting, lightweight, light-colored clothing. Avoid dark colors because they absorb the sun's rays. • Slow down, stay indoors and avoid strenuous exercise during the hottest part of the day. • Postpone outdoor games and activities •Use a buddy system when working in excessive heat. Take frequent breaks if working outdoors. • Check on animals frequently to ensure that they are not suffering from the heat. Make sure they have plenty of cool water.



PET HEALTH DUNSTABLE ANIMAL CLINIC LIPOMAS IN DOGS by Tara M. Sacramone, DVM



Lipomas are benign tumors made up of fat cells. They are extremely common in dogs, especially older female dogs, but are very rare in cats. They start off as small masses under the skin and grow slowly over time. They are soft, often oval-shaped and usually freely moveable. They can occur anywhere on the body, and most likely if your dog gets one, s/he will get others.

Lipomas are a benign form of cancer, meaning they do not spread to lymph nodes, lung or liver and tend to grow slowly over time. They can, however, bother your dog, either because of location, or because they grow too large. There are two other tumors that arise from fat; infiltrative lipoma, and liposarcoma. These are much less common, but are more aggressive cancers. They tend to be more firm, grow more quickly, and are not freely moveable.

Lipomas are diagnosed based on appearance, palpation, and sometimes fine needle aspirate (FNA). FNA involves inserting a needle into the mass and aspirating out some of the cells, which are then spread on a microscope slide. The material aspirated from a lipoma looks like clear droplets that do not dry. All lipomas float in water when removed from the body, so it is not usually necessary to submit them for histopathology. Submission to a lab is, however, the only way to definitively determine the nature of the tumor.

If your dog has one or more lipomas, you have two options. You can leave it on the dog and monitor for changes, or remove it surgically, which involves general anesthesia. Sometimes the best choice is to leave them alone, as some of you with very lumpy, bumpy dogs can understand. I generally advise leaving them alone, unless one of the following applies: 1. The lump grows quickly (e.g. doubles in size in a month or two). 2. The mass is bothering the dog, either because it is in an annoying location, such as on the leg, or in the armpit area or it is affecting how something else functions, such as a mass near the anal area, or ear. 3. The mass changes from being moveable to being attached to underlying tissues.

If you suspect your dog has one or more lipomas go to your veterinarian and you can both decide which course of action is appropriate for your dog.
