TOWN CLERK NEWS

It seems as if every day, more and more documents have to be notarized. While I'm happy to provide notary services as a courtesy, it has become cumbersome, as such that I have to develop a list of Notary guidelines. Most important to note is that no document will be notarized that is brought in dated and signed. As a notary, I must witness your signature, it does not matter that I know you. In addition, all signers must be present at the time of notarizing. The document must contain the appropriate Notarial Statement or Clause, or one will be stamped on the document by the Notary. If you have multiple documents to be notarized, please call ahead to schedule an appointment. Notary Service is not available for deeds, mortgages, wills, living wills, living trusts, or depositions. And finally, in accordance with Massachusetts Notarial Law, I will not provide service if the customer, document or circumstances of the request for Notary Service raise any issue of authenticity, ambiguity, doubt or uncertainty. In this event, the Notary may, at his/her sole discretion, decline to provide Notary Service. There is a \$1.00 fee to the town per notarized signature.

There was a 23% voter turnout at the Annual Town Election. You can find official election results on the town website. Questions 1 and 3 (water and new plow/sander for the Highway Department) passed. Question 2 (new fire truck) was a tie vote and failed. Question 4 (sidewalks) failed. Congratulations to the winners and also to all the candidates for coming forward!

It was an honor to swear in George Basbanes who will begin his 40th year as an elected member of the Planning Board, beginning his 9th term. Thank you for your service to the town.

Massachusetts law requires that your name be designated to the Inactive voter list if you failed to return the Annual Street Listing (aka the town census) by the first Monday in June. In case you are new to Massachusetts, this is a legal document required by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and you must return it to remain on the active voter list.

We still have A LOT of dogs not licensed. Please keep your dogs safe and license and tag. We are also seeing an increase in calls from residents regarding dogs roaming on their property. Carol A. We hit and surpassed our goal of collecting 50,000 box tops during this most recent school year. DUNSTABLE BOARD OF HEALTH TRANSFER STATION RATES JULY 1, 2017-JUNE 30, 2018 PERMIT FEE FOR THE TRANSFER STATION & STICKERS RECEIVED

Residents may purchase new permits on Monday-Friday from 9:00 a.m. – 4:00 p.m. and on Monday evenings from 6:00-8:00 p.m. in the town hall upper level.

Regular Permits - \$300.00 with 110 bag tags Senior Permits – (65 and over) \$200.00 with 55 bag tags Recycling Permits only \$10.00

Please bring a copy of your registration (up to 2) of the vehicle(s) using the transfer station.

You may also purchase permits through the mail by mailing a check for the appropriate amount made payable to the Town of Dunstable, copies of up to two vehicle registrations and 5 first class stamps for regular permits and 4 first class stamps for senior permits to the Dunstable Board of Health, P. O. Box 268, Dunstable, MA 01827. Recycling permits only require a copy of your registration and one first class stamp.

2017 permits and bag tags are valid until July 25, 2017 in order to allow time for residents to purchase the new permits. Any leftover bag tags may be used at the large item drop-off on the last three Saturdays in October 2017 or submitted to the town hall to enter a lottery. One name will be drawn at the Board of Health Meeting in November. The winners will receive a free permit and set of bag tags for the following year. Please remember that only the first round of bag tags purchased are eligible for the lottery. Please put you name and telephone number on each tag and drop them at the town Hall.

PLEASE REMEMBER THAT ALL VEHICLES MUST HAVE A TRANFER STATION PERMIT DECAL AFFIXED TO THEIR DRIVER SIDE WINDOW AND BAG TAGS MUST BE ON ALL BAGS BEFORE ENTERING THE TRANSFER STATION.



DIY ESTATE PLANNING MISTAKES

There are some projects, like planting some flowers, that you can do on your own, with little risk, but Estate Planning and Elder Law are not in that category. Many families take actions that seem to make sense to them and that appear reasonable from a family point of view. But, those actions can smack into the laws of Probate or the rules of Medicaid many years later. You should seek the assistance of an Elder Law Attorney whenever you are doing anything with your long-term planning, assets, real estate, or legal documentation.

Many people don't understand how important the Power of Attorney is. The spouse of a person in a nursing home without a Power of Attorney will need to go to Probate Court and seek conservatorship. He will have to ask the Court for permission to handle the assets of his spouse, then he will have to ask permission to do some ordinarily simple things like using some of those assets for household bills that are not directly those of the nursing home spouse. Basic planning we do for Medicaid requires Court approval and might be denied if not completed properly.

Another vital tool is the Will. It is essential that it have the right language to meet the laws and to make things inexpensive for the family. Leaving out a fairly standard "power to sell real estate" requires an additional, costly and time-consuming Probate Court hearing that will delay the sale of real estate and reduce the amount the heirs will inherit. Not having a Will at all is another big mistake. You need to have a Will in place.

Planning for heirs with disabilities is imperative. If assets are left outright to a person who is receiving a means-tested benefit (like MassHealth/Medicaid) that person would lose those benefits and those assets will be quickly lost to the costs of care. You must consult with an Elder and Disability Law Attorney to ensure that a proper trust or other legal tool is created to protect the assets and the ongoing needs of the beneficiary.

If you are doing anything with real estate, you should consult an attorney and discuss the whole situation and all of your options. Some people may get an attorney to write a deed to transfer ownership to children, without a thorough discussion. There are consequences to transfers of real estate to both the giver and the recipient. The entire transaction needs to be considered carefully and the right steps taken.

Doing your own plumbing, electric work, or dentistry would be foolish (unless you're a professional, and even then the dentistry thing wouldn't work). The risk is too high to justify any short-term cost savings. The same is true with Estate Planning and other legal matters. Consult with your local Elder Law Attorney.

WATER BILLS FROM THE DUNSTABLE WATER DEPARTMENT

As the Town considers the impending Water Department improvements, many people asked about what water users pay and how the rates compare to other communities. It was also apparent from the Annual Town Meeting that those not connected to the system have questions about how much the Dunstable Water Department bills for their service and consumption.

First, let's look at how the Dunstable Water Department bills the users. Bills are sent out twice a year, in the spring and fall. The "service charge" on the bill is the base rate for the service. The rest of the bill is based on consumption. The first 10,000 gallons used are billed at \$.0063 a gallon; gallons 10,001 to 20,000 are billed at \$.0073; and any additional gallons used are billed at \$.008. So for example, someone who uses 15,000 in 6 months would be billed \$129.50 (\$30 base charge + \$99.50 consumption fees). This is an annual cost per 120 hundred cubic feet of \$702. Many families in Dunstable have sprinklers or other amenities that drive up water usage in the summer months. It is not uncommon for a user to have a \$2,000 bill in the fall for those warmer months.

Let's compare this to a system similar in size, one defined as "very small" by the EPA. There are other "very small" municipal systems in Massachusetts in addition to Dunstable, according to the EPA (https://www3.epa.gov/enviro/index.html), including Carver with 414 customers, Eastham with 300 customers, and Westport with 250. The town of Westport, which sits between Fall River and New Bedford, charges its users a \$25 service fee and about \$.0117 per gallon used, according to a rate comparison performed by Tighe & Bond in 2014 (http://rates.tighebond.com/). This is an annual cost per 120 hundred cubic feet of \$1,156.

Many people want to compare larger systems that are proximate to Dunstable. Overhead and infrastructure is very different in those larger systems, leading to a different rate structure and lower rates. Tyngsborough, with a more complicated billing structure, has an annual cost per 120 hundred cubic feet of \$560 and \$480 for the same in Pepperell. Generally speaking, larger systems have lower rates because they have a larger customer base to spread the operating and infrastructure costs among.

As you can see from this 2014 published rate comparison, Dunstable's rates are higher than those of two of our abutters, but lower than the closest sized system. This is just an example, a more comprehensive rate study is going to be performed by the Dunstable Water Department as promised by the Chair of the Commission at the Annual Town Meeting. This is food for thought as you wonder if Dunstable's rates could be increased to pay for the entire extent of the necessary improvements. For anyone who wants to stay informed with the latest information, the Water Commissioners meet the 4th Tuesday of the month at 6:00 pm.



PET HEALTH **DUNSTABLE ANIMAL CLINIC** LIPOMAS IN DOGS by Tara M. Sacramone, DVM



Lipomas are benign tumors made up of fat cells. They are extremely common in dogs, especially older female dogs, but are very rare in cats. They start off as small masses under the skin and grow slowly over time. They are soft, often oval-shaped and usually freely moveable. They can occur anywhere on the body, and most likely if your dog gets one, s/he will get others.

Lipomas are a benign form of cancer, meaning they do not spread to lymph nodes, lung or liver and tend to grow slowly over time. They can, however, bother your dog, either because of location, or because they grow too large. There are two other tumors that arise from fat; infiltrative lipoma, and liposarcoma. These are much less common, but are more aggressive cancers. They tend to be more firm, grow more quickly, and are not freely moveable.

Lipomas are diagnosed based on appearance, palpation, and sometimes fine needle aspirate (FNA). FNA involves inserting a needle into the mass and aspirating out some of the cells, which are then spread on a microscope slide. The material aspirated from a lipoma looks like clear droplets that do not dry. All lipomas float in water when removed from the body, so it is not usually necessary to submit them for histopathology. Submission to a lab is, however, the only way to definitively determine the nature of the tumor.

If your dog has one or more lipomas, you have two options. You can leave it on the dog and monitor for changes, or remove it surgically, which involves general anesthesia. Sometimes the best choice is to leave them alone, as some of you with very lumpy, bumpy dogs can understand. I generally advise leaving them alone. unless one of the following applies: 1. The lump grows quickly (e.g. doubles in size in a month or two). 2. The mass is bothering the dog, either because it is in an annoying location, such as on the leg, or in the armpit area or it is affecting how something else functions, such as a mass near the anal area, or ear. 3. The mass changes from being moveable to being attached to underlying tissues.

If you suspect your dog has one or more lipomas go to your veterinarian and you can both decide which course of action is appropriate for your dog.

"BUT EVEN NOW THERE IS HOPE"

By Nathan Combs

Discovering the depth of one's own sinfulness is inevitably a devastating experience that has driven some to despair and even suicide (Judas - Matthew 27.5). It has led others, however, to weep and return to God as humbled servants (like Peter: Luke 22.32, 1 Peter 1.13). One such example is found in Ezra 10. Ezra the priest had led a group of Jewish exiles out of Persia and back to their homeland in about 458 B.C. Upon arriving in Judah, Ezra soon discovered that some of the exiles who emigrated before him had made a dreadful mistake. They had married foreign women, transgressing a strict command of the law (Deuteronomy 7.3)! As Ezra tried to absorb this appalling news, he was encouraged to help the people, for "even now there is hope for Israel in spite of this" (Ezra 10.2). Let's notice how the people reunited with God.

- 1) The exiles were profoundly sorrowful. While Ezra was praying and weeping, a "very great assembly" gathered, "wept bitterly" because of their sin (Ezra 10.1), and trembled in the heavy rain (Ezra 10.9). Because their hearts were tender, they were receptive to Ezra's radical command to separate from their foreign wives and children. Only the deepest sorrow over sin could compel them to take such drastic measures. When you and I discover sins that we are (in a sense) married to, we'll require much godly sorrow (2 Corinthians 7.10) before we're willing to take extreme steps. Do you have the kind of profound remorse for your sins that these Jews did?
- 2) The exiles made vows to change. It's one thing to vaguely desire a change in lifestyle. It is something else to make vows before witnesses and actually *commit* to taking specific, drastic measures to effect change. Ezra compelled the Jews around him to make a covenant with God to put away their families. What is your plan for fighting your sins? Have you considered confessing and making promises in the presence of other Christians close to you, so that your progress can be held accountable? In 1 Timothy 6.12, Paul encouraged reminded Timothy that he made a "good confession *in the presence of many witnesses.*"
- 3) The changes were diligently enacted. When sin in your life is uncovered, how quickly do you act to address it? Ezra quickly sent out a proclamation to the people, ordering them to come to Jerusalem within three days. Ezra was then told by the gathered assembly that correcting the situation could not happen overnight (Ezra 10.13). It would eventually take about three months for the elders and judges to sort through the people and help them separate from their families. Perhaps you know there are changes that need to make in your lifestyle and attitude, yet you know, like those Jews did, that it won't be the work of one or two days. Don't despair! Follow their example of diligence and push forward, motivated by your hope in God's ability to change you.





100 DEADLIEST DAYS HERE FOR TEEN DRIVERS

Teens most at risk for fatal crashes during summer With high schools closed and summer vacations getting underway, the bright sunny days of summer can be a dark time for teen drivers. Memorial Day to Labor Day marks the "100 Deadliest Days" for Teen Drivers." More teens are killed on the roads during this time of year than any other.

Automobile crashes are the No. 1 killer of teenagers in the U.S. with nearly 5,000 teens killed every year and more than 300,000 injured. This tragedy is compounded by the fact that many crashes are preventable. Driver error, speeding and distractions are the main causes of teen crashes, and seemingly simple activities such as switching radio stations or interacting with friends can significantly impair a teen's ability to react quickly to changing traffic conditions.

A majority of teens admit to risky driving behaviors. Fifty-six percent make and answer phone calls while driving. Fifty-five percent exceed the speed limit by more than 10 mph. The area of the human brain that controls multitasking, impulse control and the ability to envision consequences - areas crucial for driving - is still developing well into an individual's 20s. Talking on a cell phone increases the likelihood of an accident by four times and slows the average person's reaction time to that of a 70- year-old.

Parents need to play a large role in developing their teen's safe driving behaviors. Parents usually acknowledge that they must play a significant role in preparing their teens to drive, but many delay safe-driving conversations with their teens until shortly before licensure. Parents also understand they are role models on the road, yet their driving behaviors send the wrong message. For example, 71 percent admit to talking on a cell phone while driving with their teens, and 26 percent say they have broken the law with their teens in the car.

Here are some tips for parents to start a conversation with teens about smart driving:

Make your talks a dialog about driving. Remember, teens are excited about driving itself; it's a fun topic for them. So don't turn your talks into lectures; instead, make them open dialogs that show you understand the positive side of getting behind the wheel, and let your teens share their views and experiences at the same time. Speak to their desire to be smart. Being a "safe driver" is not something teens aspire to become. Smart driving, on the other hand, combines skill and safety, and is something that teens can attain. Empower vour teen. Being a passenger in another teen's car can put your teen at risk. Peer pressure among teens can be both positive and negative. Make sure your teen knows it's okay to say something if they are uncomfortable while riding with a friend. Be Parental. Express Your Authority. Your teens want to know your values and expect you to provide structure for them. They need you to be a parent, not another friend. Consider using a Parent Teen Driving Contract to explain driving rules of your home. And, consistently enforce those rules. If your teen violates those rules, deliver on the consequences! Though taking away the driving privilege for a period of time might not be convenient for you, it might end up saving your teen's life.
