• An additional amendment to the Town of Dunstable General Bylaws adopted under the warrant for the Annual Town Meeting of May 8, 2017 was approved by the Attorney General on September 11, 2017 but omitted from last month's list. It was Article 35, Municipal Stormwater Discharge Bylaw. A copy of these amendments and bylaws may be examined or obtained at the Office of the Town Clerk during regular business hours at the Dunstable Town Hall. The effective date of the adoption or amendment of any Zoning ordinance or bylaw shall be the date on which such adoption or amendment was voted upon by a town meeting once the posting has been satisfied.

FROM THE TOWN ADMINISTRATOR

There are several articles on the Special Town Meeting warrant that have a financial impact on the town. Details below:

The Board of Selectmen recently completed negotiations with the Police Union, resulting in a new three-year contract that includes salary increases and other benefits. The details of the increases and benefits cannot yet be discussed publicly as the contract still needs to be signed. The cost of this article is \$35,000 and is proposed to be funded by free cash. The Advisory Board was aware of this when they were planning for the FY18 budget and held back some free cash in order to fund this when the contract was signed.

Three articles are related to the proposed Public Safety Building. The first of these three articles asks the community to accept a donation of land for the purpose of building a Public Safety Building. The reasons for choosing this property for the Public Safety Building are listed in the feasibility study, which is available on the Town website. The next article asks for \$1,800 from free cash to pay for the legal fees associated with this donation. And the final article requests the funds, just under \$10,000, to survey the property. The survey will be a full site survey that includes topographic and other information.

As a result of the process of creating an updated Master Plan, the Selectmen have frequently been asked about what kinds of commercial and residential opportunities might arise if the Town Center Overlay District passed. While the district proposal has been withdrawn from the Special Town Meeting warrant, the Selectmen thought it might still be useful to understand what kinds of opportunities and challenges might exist for the town. The analysis would be completed by a specialized firm and is estimated to cost \$17,500. The warrant also asks voters to consider expending \$3,500 to hire an actuary to estimate the cost of offering "other post-employment benefits" (OPEB) to municipal employees. Dunstable is one of a handful of towns within the Commonwealth that does not offer this benefit.

Finally, the Groton-Dunstable Regional School District has asked the town to consider approving the creation of a Capital Stabilization Fund for district capital costs. This request was made a few years ago but did not pass in Dunstable. Both towns much approve of the action in order to create the fund. While Dunstable does not plan to put any funds in the account, the district would have the opportunity to move any excess funds into this account themselves. These excess funds could occur if the E&D (excess and deficiency) account reaches a balance that is more than 5% of the district's total budget. There are additional items on the Special Town Meeting warrant, but these are the ones that are most significant or unusual. Others are typical articles, such as paying unpaid bills, and have a slighter impact on the town, especially from a financial perspective.



Residents may purchase new permits on Monday-Friday from 9:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m. and on Monday evenings from 6:00-8:00 p.m. in the town hall upper level.

Regular Permits -	\$300.00 with 110 bag tags
Senior Permits – (65 and over)	\$200.00 with 55 bag tags
Recycling Permits only	\$ 10.00

Please bring a copy of your registration (up to 2) of the vehicle(s) using the transfer station.

You may also purchase permits through the mail by mailing a check for the appropriate amount made payable to the Town of Dunstable, copies of up to two vehicle registrations and 5 first class stamps for regular permits and 4 first class stamps for senior permits to the Dunstable Board of Health, P. O. Box 268, Dunstable, MA 01827. Recycling permits only require a copy of your registration and one first class stamp.

Any leftover bag tags from last year may be submitted to the town hall to enter a lottery. One name will be drawn at the Board of Health Meeting in November. The winner will receive a free permit and set of bag tags for the following year. Please remember that only the first round of bag tags purchased are eligible for the lottery. Please put you name and telephone number on each tag and drop them at the town Hall.

PLEASE REMEMBER THAT ALL VEHICLES MUST HAVE A TRANFER STATION PERMIT DECAL AFFIXED TO THEIR DRIV-ER SIDE WINDOW AND BAG TAGS MUST BE ON ALL BAGS BEFORE ENTERING THE TRANSFER STATION.

IRAS & 401(K) PLANS AND YOUR SPOUSE

Most people now have IRA and 401(k) accounts that are a large part of their retirement savings. These accounts pass by beneficiary designation when you die. Your Will does not control them. So, you must be sure your beneficiary designations are up-to-date and you need to consider who should get those assets and what the tax consequences to them might be.

If you are married, you need to consider your spouse's right to be a beneficiary of your retirement accounts. Spouses are treated differently depending on the type of account. A 401(k) account provides protections for a surviving spouse, who must either be named as the beneficiary or who will be the default beneficiary, unless the spouse waived that right in writing. 401(k) plans are employer retirement accounts controlled by the Federal Law known as ERISA (the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974). IRA plans are not governed by ERISA and they can go to any beneficiary that the owner chooses. A surviving spouse does not have a right to be a beneficiary of an IRA and has no claim on it if not named.

An IRA account is not controlled by ERISA even if the funds in the IRA used to be in a 401(k) account and were rolled over into the IRA. Once out of the 401(k) plan, the spouse loses any protections of ERISA. So, if you have any IRA account and want your spouse to be the beneficiary, you must ensure that you designate this on the proper form with your IRA custodian (the bank or brokerage).

You can name anyone as beneficiary of your IRA, not just your spouse. There may be reasons and perhaps some advantages of doing so. You might be in a second marriage and want to provide for your children. Or, a much older spouse might wind up having to take more out of the IRA and paying more in taxes than you. If your spouse doesn't need the IRA funds, there might be tax advantages to naming a younger beneficiary (a child or grandchild perhaps) who can spread out withdrawals over many more years. If you are in a second marriage, you might want your own children to inherit these assets and so name them instead of your spouse.

You should routinely check your retirement account beneficiaries and update them as necessary and desirable. You should check the designations if you had a major change in life such as a death or a marriage. If you have 401(k) funds, you need to plan for your spouse's right to get those funds. With IRA funds you can choose any beneficiary so you have to think that through. Consult with your legal or financial advisor for help with these beneficiary designation issues.



Have you ever seen a great photograph and wonder how the person got that shot? If you are like me, you may have thought: "Must be a great camera or a high-quality lens." Well, as my photography mentor Joe Baraban tells me, it is the 6" behind the lens that actually makes the difference – you the photographer. I have shot some of my best photos with a small point & shoot Panasonic pocket sized camera rather than my bigger more expensive gear. I learned to always carry the small camera with me just in case an opportunity arises for a great shot.

My wife Joyce and I were staying at the Thornhedge Inn in Bar Harbor, Maine. The early morning sun was shining through the partially opened blinds creating wonderful bands of light across the room. We were getting ready to go down for breakfast but I just had to stop to grab a shot of the scene. I quickly took out the Panasonic and started shooting. I did not want to take the time to dig out the bigger gear because the sun moves quickly that time of the day, and I wasn't all that sure that Joyce would wait for me, again! The photos I took were ok but I was not excited. Then I noticed a beautiful bouquet of fresh flowers that the inn keeper had left in our room. So. "coloring-outside-the-lines". I moved the vase and positioned the flowers in the bands of light. I then set the camera to manual mode (I did not trust the camera to make the proper exposure) and made several different exposures making sure to balance the light against the dark bands. Also, I made sure that the flowers were in focus - as sharp as could be. A unique opportunity for a unique image. Here are my settings: Panasonic DMC - ZS100; zoomed to 18.2mm; ISO 400; F8 @ 1/160. Home bible studies in Nashua, Tyngsboro, Dracut, and Lowell. ARE YOU ASKING THE RIGHT QUESTIONS?

If I'm trying to drive to a particular location and find myself in need of directions, the kind of questions I ask the locals will affect my ability to arrive at my desired destination. For example, if I ask, "Is it possible to get to _____ by taking this road?", I might receive an answer such as: "Well, it's technically possible, but it will certainly involve some confusing and difficult routes!" However, if I ask, "What is the best possible way to get to _____?", I've provided a wide opening for my road assistant to give me his big picture view of the most beneficial route.

Just as our ability to drive depends on asking the right questions, so does our ability to accurately and wisely discern the Scriptures. Many take a pet topic to the Bible with the question of "Is _ a sin or not?", as if the Bible was written as a bland law code or an encyclopedia of morality. Many approach issues of godliness or salvation or the church by simply looking for specific lines in the sand and then feel justified in living however they want when the Bible doesn't explicitly answer their questions. A selfish and misplaced concentration on "How far is too far?" doesn't lead to true knowledge of God's character. It certainly doesn't lead to mature appreciation of the richness of the Bible narrative and the foundational principles and themes that permeate the entirety of Scripture; it simply leads to ignorance and flirtation with spiritual disaster.

The Pharisees are good examples of this trap. They approached Jesus in Matthew 19.3 with a question that was controversial in their time (and ours): "Is it lawful to divorce one's wife for any cause?" They wanted Jesus to locate the precise line of sin. It is significant that Jesus did not directly reply with "yes" or "no." He told them that they were asking the wrong question. Hadn't they read in Genesis about the origin and blueprint of marriage? Didn't they understand that when two people marry, God intricately weaves them together, body and soul? Man must not break apart the permanent and beautiful designs of God. Aha!, the Pharisees craftily replied. What about Deuteronomy 24.1-4? Clearly the Scriptures allow a man to divorce his wife! Jesus deftly dismantled their question by pointing out that God was simply regulating an ungodly practice of which He did not approve. "From the beginning ... " God wanted married couples to retain their permanent bond until death. In their misquided fixation on the wrong guestion, the Pharisees missed fundamental truth about God and His designs.

Instead of just asking "Is it lawful...", why not ask, how can I best please the Lord (Ephesians 5.10)? How can I best contribute to the plan to unite all things in Christ (Ephesians 1.10)? How can I best display the wisdom of God to the rulers and authorities in the heavenly places (Ephesians 3.10)? Are you asking the right questions?

ARE YOU A DISTRACTED DRIVER?



Ever tried to eat a cheeseburger while behind the wheel? What about trying to separate your two fighting kids in the back seat? Ever reached down to pick up a CD that fell on the floor while driving? We all become more comfortable driving as the years progress, but unfortunately many of us become a little too confident. Your license to drive is not a license to drive while simultaneously reading the newspaper, putting on your makeup and chowing down a quick breakfast. Let's take a look at some common distractions. Are you guilty of

performing any of these activities while driving? Outside Distractions. Whether it's a human billboard pointing the way to new homes, a beautiful rainbow, a bad accident, or a restaurant that just opened, most of us just cannot resist the urge to take a look, even when we should be concentrating on the road. Sicknesses. A bad cough, a sudden onset of sneezes and searching your car for a tissue to catch that runny nose, or a tension headache, these are all examples of how being sick can distract you from driving. Not to mention the fact that most of us are not at our most alert when we are sick. That's why it is extra important to pay attention to the road and to wait until you are stopped at a traffic light to reach for that tissue. Of course we can't predict sneezes, but make sure you quickly look back to the road after you sneeze. Inspector Gadget Automobiles nowadays can have more controls than a small airplane. Besides the obvious stereo and temperature controls, many cars have features such as navigation systems, televisions. CD players, etc and these can all be especially distracting, as it takes at least one hand off the wheel to pick out a CD and put it in, especially if your pack of CDs is on the ground and you have to reach for them...which brings us to ... Reaching for the Unreachable We are all guilty of this at one time or another. For some reason, we just HAVE to have that book in the back seat in our hands right now. But this is one of the worst driver distractions...as it usually means that our hand or hands are off the wheel AND our eyes are off the road. Next time, try to make yourself wait to grab that errant CD until you are stopped at a traffic light. Or, if it's safe, pull over and grab whatever you need. Eating and Drinking One of the most common driver distractions is eating and/or drinking while driving. Some of the worst foods to eat while driving are coffee/ tea (spilling these on your leg will certainly distract you), messy hamburgers/sandwiches that drop stuff all over you while you are driving, anything fried that leaves you with greasy hands that could slip off the steering wheel, and, things like chocolate or jelly doughnuts that leave your hands sticky. Try to avoid eating on the road whenever possible. If you're in a rush, grab a guick bite and eat it in the parking lot before leaving. Distracting Discussions Ever gotten in a heated debate while driving? What about listening and intervening as your children in the backseat start arguing? Interaction with your passengers is another common driving distraction. This can especially be a problem for new drivers, who should focus all their attention on their driving and not on their passengers. Beautification You forgot to put on your mascara/brush your hair/shave. What better place to do it then in the car, right? Wrong! Things that involve tools not only take your hands off the wheel and your eyes off the road, they also have the potential to hurt you and cause further distraction. If you are a woman putting on your mascara or a man shaving, and you have to brake suddenly, think of the injuries that could happen! Cell Phones We all know that talking on a cell phone can distract our attention from driving. We all know that we should use hands-free devices whenever possible (although these can still be a distraction, just like the distracting discussions topic above). Yet a large percentage of us still talk on our cell phones frequently while driving. Try to keep your cell phone use while driving limited to emergencies only. If you get a call you really want to take, pull over in a safe spot and have your conversation.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration states that distracted driving causes around 25 percent of the auto accidents in the U.S. each year. That's nearly 1.6 million accidents annually caused by many of the things I've discussed above, most of which are so easily preventable. Try to avoid letting distractions take your attention away from what you should be doing, concentrating on driving and protecting the lives of you and your passengers.

PET HEALTH DUNSTABLE ANIMAL CLINIC **MAMMARY CANCER IN DOGS & CATS** by Tara M. Sacramone, DVM



October was mammary cancer awareness Month, and I realize

it is November, but better late than never. Both dogs and cats can get mammary cancer, but the specific kinds of cancer and the prognosis is drastically different for cats versus dogs. Dogs tend to fair better than cats. It is more common in females than males, but males can get it.


Mammary cancer is the third most common cancer in cats. Unfortunately it is 80-96% malignant in cats. It usually has spread by the time you find the mammary mass. It can spread to lymph nodes, lungs and even internal organs. It almost always has a grave prognosis, and the bigger the mass the worse the prognosis. You can decrease the risk by having your cat spayed, especially if you have your cat spayed by six months of age.

If you find a lump on your dog's mammary chain half the time it is benign and half the time it is malignant. Even the malignant forms often have not spread at the time of initial diagnosis, but they can spread to lungs and lymph nodes. Mammary cancer is not as common in dogs. If the lump is benign surgery is often curative. Spaying your dog also drastically decreases the risk, especially if done before her second heat.


The mammary chain in dogs and cats extends all the way from the front legs to the back legs, so if you find a lump anywhere on your pet's abdomen bring them to your veterinarian right away. Sometimes chest radiographs and an abdominal ultrasound are done to look for cancer spread prior to surgical removal of the mass. If the pet is not already spayed then that is usually done at the same time. Because of the poor prognosis in cats some owners do not have the mass removed. Every patient is an individual so there is not a "one fits all" treatment plan.
