

TOWN CLERK NEWS

Just a reminder that unless you qualify for a permanent absentee ballot, your application is only valid for all elections in one (1) calendar year. If you filed an application in 2017, it has expired. The Primary is September 4 and the State Election is November 6. It's not too early to file an absentee application. Early voting is during the business hours of the Town Clerk. More information to come on early voting.

The Selectmen have called a Special Town Election with ballot questions for Tuesday, June 26. Polls open 12 noon to 8PM. If you are away, remember you can vote absentee and file an absentee ballot application. You can vote here at a time arranged with the Town Clerk or have the ballot mailed. Massachusetts law does NOT allow you to leave with a ballot. One exception – the voter has been admitted to a healthcare facility after noon on the fifth day before the election and designates (in writing) a person to hand-deliver the ballot. That person may not be a candidate for office or sponsor of a ballot question.

Nomination papers are now available at my office for the position of Greater Lowell Regional School Committee representative. This is a result of a court ruling from a lawsuit filed against the Towns of Dunstable, Dracut and Tyngsboro by the City of Lowell, we will elect our Greater Lowell Regional School Committee members for a 4-year term on the November state election ballot. Candidates must submit nomination papers to this office for certification no later than 5:00 pm on Tuesday, July 24, 2018. You must be a registered voter.

IT'S DIFFERENT NOW – HELP FOR TEENS

"In my day, we walked 10 miles to school barefoot in the dead of winter..." Probably not, but even if this archetypal tale of parental yesteryears turned out to be true, a walk in a typical teenager's shoes is likely tougher than today's parents might imagine. The National Alliance for Mental Illness (NAMI) reports that 20% of youth age 13-18 live with a mental health condition. And according to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), suicide is the second-leading cause of death for 15-24 year-olds.

There is help. Researchers generally agree that Psychotherapy "Talk Therapy" – improves outcomes for the depressed, both as a stand-alone treatment and in conjunction with prescription medicine. Teens and young adults, just like their older counterparts, can benefit from a trusting therapeutic relationship that helps them articulate and address problems related to their unique life stage.

Specifically, adolescence is a period of physical and emotional upheaval. The average teen's mood and functioning have always been impacted by a changing body combined with developmental imperatives to be recognized by peers while seeking independence from family. Add today's digital overload to the emotional mix and it is small wonder that researchers, including at Columbia University and the National Institutes of Health (NIH) have reported significant increases in the prevalence of major depression among teens since 2010; some studies correlate this trend with increased "screen time" including on smart-phones.

David Harrison, LICSW, clinician and intake coordinator at Greenbridge Counseling and Wellness, LLC, spent a decade working in schools with anxious and depressed 16-21 year-olds. Via talk therapy, Dave offers adolescents a safe space for tackling the unique stressors that they face, helping them feel less isolated with pain and self-doubt that might otherwise become unmanageable.

Per the CDC: "The risk for suicide frequently occurs in combination with external circumstances that seem to overwhelm at-risk teens... Examples of stressors are disciplinary problems, interpersonal losses, family violence, sexual orientation confusion, physical and sexual abuse and being the victim of bullying." That is, as with adults, adolescent mental health is affected by a variety of factors including personal history, situational triggers and biological predisposition. For instance, parents should be aware that a family history of depression or other mood disorders increases any adolescent's risk for depression.

Symptoms of adolescent depression consist of both emotional and behavioral changes including (but not limited to) hopelessness; low self-esteem; loss of interest in normal activities; changes in sleep patterns; social isolation and poor school performance. Common signs of suicidality in teens include (but are not limited to) talking or joking about suicide; general preoccupation with death; engaging in reckless behavior; saying good-bye as if for the last time.







OLD FASHIONED FAMILY LIVING

Before WWII it was common for several generations to live in the same house (remember the TV show the *Waltons?*). After the war the "nuclear family" became the norm with Mom, Dad and kids in one house, while Grandparents and other generations lived in their own homes. The single-family suburban home was the American Dream for years, but it has lost its luster as the cost of housing has increased along with the care needs of family members. Living together with family can provide a built-in caregiving system. It can be handy and cost-effective. But, it can also prove stressful. Should you consider a multi-generational living arrangement for your family?

One issue to consider is whether the situation will be short-term or long-term. Many people have a parent live with them temporarily after an illness or injury. Other families have taken built "in-law" apartments onto their homes and allowed parents to move in for many years. A short-term stay will require some adjustment but it will end and your life can go back to normal. A long-term plan will change your lives significantly and needs more planning and thought.

You will need to consider how the costs of living will be shared. Will the elders (or adult children) pay rent or just pay a part of the household expenses? And, how will the living area of the house be used? Will the elders be restricted to a certain part of the house or can they use it all? Privacy considerations are important. Everyone wants privacy for basic situations such as dressing and bathing, but everyone also needs privacy for intimate issues (even elders). You must think this through to accommodate everyone's needs.

If there is a younger generation in your multi-generational house, how will that work? Will the youngsters make it hard for the elders to relax? Will there be competition to use the facilities? Also, will the needs of those with disabilities require any modifications such as ramps, larger doorways or walk-in showers? This may mean the home would have to be extensively renovated.

Living with someone with care needs can require a lot of work. Who will do the chores in the house such as cooking and cleaning? Who will provide the personal care to the elder? Is there going to be compensation for personal caregiving? Will outside caregivers need to be hired and what accommodation does that require?

The old-fashioned way of living like the Waltons can be really nice with older and younger generations providing things to each other that cannot be found in any other way. Or, it can be noisy, crowded, confrontational and frustrating. It might work for you but it will take planning and co-operation to make it work. You should consult with your Elder Law Attorney about some of the legal issues that might arise before you take this step.

WATER SAFETY

As warmer weather approaches please remember the essential water safety tips while spending time on the lakes, ponds, rivers and the ocean this summer. Please remain safe while enjoying your time in and on the water. Be alert, be aware and watch over children at all times. Tragedy can strike in a moment, so please use the safety tips offered at all times.

The Merrimack River is a popular boating and kayaking destination during the summer months. Current boating activities on the river include canoeing, kayaking, rowing and power boating. The river provides both quickwater and flatwater experiences for canoeists and kayakers and is one of the largest surface water bodies in the region for power boating. Massapoag Pond is also heavily utilized for boating, fishing and swimming.

The American Canoe Association offers the following safety tips to kayakers, paddlers, and recreational boaters: • Always wear a life jacket.

Children under the age of 12 must wear a life jacket in a public body of water at all times.

• Be a competent swimmer with the ability to handle oneself underwater, moving water, surf or current.

• Keep the craft under control. Do not enter a rapid unless you are reasonably sure you can navigate it or swim the entire rapid in case you capsize.

• Keep a lookout for hazards and avoid them. Watch for fog, especially on coastal waters.

• Know your emotional and physical limitations.

• Group members need to constantly assess the behavior of others in their group.

LIVING WITH DEER

As the human population continues to grow, much of our wildlife has become engulfed in residential development. The white tail deer has not only adapted to these changes but is thriving in this new suburban habitat that offers a deer haven restaurant in every landscape. It is important to note that many of human/deer conflicts result from the backyard buffets that we have created for them. **Description**

White tail deer can be seen throughout Massachusetts. The average height of an adult male (buck) is 6 feet tall and weighs between 120-160 pounds. The buck's antlers are composed of bone that is shed after each breeding season (late winter). A female deer (doe), is slightly smaller and weighs between 80-120 pounds. The doe's offspring (fawns) are chestnut brown in color with white spots on their back and sides. The spots provide camouflage from predators and fade by 3-4 months of age.

The deer is an excellent jumper and capable of clearing obstacles up to 9 feet high. Deer's are also impeccable runners. If startled, a white tail can run at speeds up to 40 mph. They also have a keen sense of hearing and smell. Deer's also have night vision and able to see most colors except those in the red-orange spectrum. These colors appear as gray which is why hunters will often wear bright orange for safety. The deer is most active at dawn and dusk.

Deer in the garden: Adjust what you plant. Deer are browsers and their taste buds will vary within the season. Your local Cooperative Extension Service is an excellent source of information for the types of flowers and shrubbery that are distasteful to deer's in your area. <u>Do not feed the deer</u>. This can have painful and deadly consequences as the deer's digestive system will only digest certain foods at specific times of the year.

Fencing: Fencing may be an option for keeping a deer out of the garden. Check with your local co-op for fencing options but keep in mind that a hungry deer can jump up to 9 feet high.

Repellants & Scare devices: "Deer Away" and "Liquid Fence" may be useful and can be purchased at your local coop. You might also try placing human or animal hair directly on the plants. Scarecrow Motion Activated Sprinklers or Havahart Spray Away- Elite Motion Detector (hose free-solar powered) that uses an infra-red technology to detect animal movement is sometimes useful.

Final word: Deer are curious and motivated by their need to eat. They will test and retest the deterrents you use. You can stay one step ahead of them by changing your deterrents often so that they don't become accustomed to them.

Simplest solution: Planting bushes such as boxwoods or flowers such as lavender or peonies known to be distasteful to them.

Tips for Residents Drive Carefully: Particularly in the fall during breeding season as Bucks have been known to dart across the road without hesitation. When **driving at night**, and you encounter a deer frozen in place please slow down. When the cars headlight beam falls into the deer's eye it becomes temporarily blinded by the bright light. A deer will not move until its eyes adjust which takes a minute of two.

Leave fawns alone: They are often left alone by their mothers to not draw attention of predators. They are also nursed every 2-6 hours. The mother will return when you leave.

A word about Lyme Disease: Lyme disease is a serious public health issue. Originally the tick responsible for the disease was called a "Deer tick". This misnomer has perpetuated the false belief that deer alone are responsible for transmitting Lyme disease. The truth is that Lyme's Disease can be transmitted within multiple hosts and varying landscapes. In fact, other hosts include mice, chipmunks, squirrels, lizards and even certain species of song birds. New research indicates that the incidence of Lyme Disease in humans is affected more from the larval tick's host (whited mice and chipmunks). VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

Friends of Flint Pond is a newly forming group whose interest is in the continuing recovery of the pond, with a strong focus on keeping a healthy fishery (once one of the top bass fishing ponds in the state), and bird habitat (I've recorded over 100 species of birds from my back yard, recent visitors may have seen the amazing osprey eagle skirmishes). We will continue to concentrate on addressing invasive weeds, focusing on removal of water chestnuts (which does not have to be done at the neighborhood organized events, it can be done any time you visit the pond-there are some who are here almost every day, just bring a bag and spend a few minutes before you leave filling it, and deposit it in the designated area. It WILL make a difference), also pulling out the masses of dead pond weed that clog the pond and would otherwise decay and add to the overload of nutrients in the pond.

If we can get enough volunteers, we also hope to try some nonchemical, less expensive, methods to address some of the weeds, building and yearly maintenance and installation of benthic barriers, use of leaf tarps. The state would like us to do a full assessment of the pond, looking at areas of erosion, and identifying and finding solutions for off-site pollutants. These projects are great to have on a college resume for environmental science students.

This group will be very casual, there will be no officers, no required meetings, no dues, no official status, we will communicate by e-mail (or update by phone if you don't have e-mail access) or get together at the pond if/when we want. The Tyngsboro Conservation Commission and Flint Pond Association, who are actively involved with the pond, require town residency to join, but many users of the pond are from out of town. This group will give all users of the pond an opportunity to share their concerns/interests to help in the ongoing recovery. It will also assist a small neighborhood to do what they can't on their own.

There are also always opportunities to earn NHS hours on pond concerns, extra kayaks are available for use. A THS student, Madison Parker, set up a website as part of her Gold award project for girl scouts. We would like to see this site easier to access and increase usage of it, posting updates and planned activities.



PET HEALTH DUNSTABLE ANIMAL CLINIC ANOTHER REASON **TO** QUIT SMOKING by Tara M. Sacramone, DVM



We all know the serious health risks related to smoking cigarettes. We are also becoming more and more aware of the risks of secondhand smoke. But did you know that your pets are also at risk from secondhand smoke?

A recent study, involving 180 cats treated at Tufts University's Foster Hospital for Small Animals between 1993 and 2000, indicated that cats that lived with a smoker had almost twice the risk of getting lymphoma as cats that lived with nonsmokers. Lymphoma is a specific form of malignant cancer involving lymphocytes, the cells that cause inflammation. The study also offered evidence that the risks increase in correlation with the number of smokers in the house. In a house of two or more smokers, the chance of getting lymphoma went up 4.1 times. Additionally, the longer the cats lived with secondhand smoke, the more likely the cats were to develop lymphoma (exposure of greater than 5 years multiplied rates by 3.2).

Indoor cats are at an additional disadvantage because their exposure to smoke is constant. Even when no one is smoking, there are traces of smoke and/or ash in the house. Cats ingest these smoke/ash particles during grooming.

Common sense tells us that secondhand smoke is not good for anyone, but this is a definitive study which links secondhand smoke to cancer in cats. The exact causes of cancer are still not known, but this study shows that environmental factors are definitely involved. So please, for your own health, and for the health of humans and animals around you, QUIT SMOKING!







HOW CAN I SAFELY TRANSPORT HAZARDOUS WASTE

Leave materials in original containers

Tighten caps and lids Sort and pack separately: oil paint, pesticides and household cleaners Pack containers in sturdy upright boxes and pad with newspapers NEVER MIX CHEMICALS NEVER SMOKE while handling hazardous material

*non-hazardous - can be discarded in trash (latex paint needs to be dried out before discarding)
