TOWN CLERK NEWS

Notice of Increase in Fees for Vital Records. Mandates from the Department of Health, Registry of Vital Records, have resulted in increased costs to issue birth, death and marriage certificates. These costs include the purchase of special security paper and the current fee of \$5.00 is no longer sustainable. In accordance with MGL Chapter 40, Section 22F, effective July 1, 2019 the cost will increase to \$10.00 per copy which is comparable to many other towns. Fees are deposited to the General Fund. The cost to file your notice of marriage intentions will remain at \$25.00 and include one certified copy. Additional copies will now increase to \$10.00 per copy. Please note the kennel fees are subject to the approval of the Attorney General via submission of the bylaws.

The fee for 12 months is \$300.00. New subscribers during the year will have their fee pro-rated \$25 each month.

SHOULD YOU DOWNSIZE OR AGE IN PLACE?

You must consider what you are going to do in the future when you need help with your everyday activities or if you have trouble living at home. Are you going to stay in the home where you are now, or are you going to move somewhere else? You should think about this issue before a crisis occurs and make the choice on your own terms rather than being forced into a quick decision.

Most people would prefer to stay at home and "Age in Place." Home is where everything is familiar, and it is where you are most comfortable. But many homes were not built for elders and those with disabilities. Will your house be suitable for you if you cannot climb stairs or cannot step into a bathtub?

City living has advantages over suburban housing. In the city there are more services, transportation options, and people nearby to help. Suburban and rural seniors (especially those who lose the ability to drive) can get isolated, lonely, and even die because they get cut off from needed services. But, if you have lived in a smaller town for years, a move to a city may not be for you.

The housing statistics are showing that fewer elders are selling their homes than ever before. This is affecting the prices of homes and the stock available for younger people to buy. Younger people are preferring cities and urban living, which may leave more elders unable to sell their homes. But it may get harder for those older folks to retain their single-family homes. It may be too costly for a couple or single elder to live in a multi-bedroom home. Taxes and other expenses could make it impossible for a senior to continue affording a home that they love.

There are several considerations on whether or not to move. Is your home age-friendly? Will it work for you if you cannot climb stairs or have mobility issues? Are there services, friends, and family nearby to help you? Are there transportation options if you cannot drive?

If you are looking at moving, should you move to an apartment, condominium, or some sort of retirement community? Is the new facility designed with the needs of aging people in mind? Can you afford the new location and are there extra costs to live there? What services can you get in the new location? Is family near to the new location?


It is more difficult to move when you reach your 70s or 80s. If you think downsizing is right for you, then you should consider doing it in your 60s or early 70s rather than waiting. If you plan to stay where you are, then you should plan to coordinate the care and services you may need at home.

DO YOU WORK FOR GOD'S PRAISE OR MAN'S?

Affirmation is important to us. Regardless of our personality, gender, or culture, we appreciate hearing others tell us that we're doing a good job. We value positive performance reviews in business, we cherish thoughtfully written notes, and our hearts are warmed by a well-placed comment. Social media companies like Facebook well understand the power of praise and tempt us to over-check their websites, searching for the "likes" and "loves" of our friends. Praise is certainly encouraging, but like many other beneficial things, it can become idolatrous and destructive if it is the driving force of our behavior.

In Jesus' Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5-7), he takes direct aim at the Pharisees for this very problem. Members of this conservative religious sect sounded trumpets when they gave to the poor in the streets and synagogues, they habitually prayed in public places, and they did not maintain personal hygiene when fasting, so "that they may be praised by others" (Matt. 6.2ff). Instead, Jesus encouraged his followers to serve the Lord without fanfare, so that "your Father who sees in secret will reward you" (Matt. 6.4, 6, 18). Rather than forbidding us to look for any praise whatsoever, Jesus redirects our God-given need for praise back to our Maker. This is an infinitely more satisfying place to look for it!

No matter how much we might try to flaunt our deeds, there is no guarantee of human awareness or appreciation. Even if we do receive praise from others, it might be inadequately given or based on unrighteous evaluations. After all, the prophet Ezekiel was praised for his sermons, but only because he was considered a masterful performer, not because his audience was pierced by God's words (Ezekiel 33.31-33). With God, however, we have an attentive Father who not only notices every good work we do, but also will not fail to praise us for them.

Later in Matthew's gospel, Jesus tells a parable of three servants who were entrusted by their master with his property. Each was given an amount of money proportional to his ability to manage it. One of the servants squandered his opportunities to multiply his "talent." The other two, however, both doubled the value of their allotments and were warmly praised by their master. Each man was told, "Well done, good and faithful servant. You have been faithful over a little; I will set you over much. Enter into the joy of your master" (Matthew 25.21, 23). Since this parable is in the context of the final judgment day scene pictured by Jesus (Matthew 25.31-46), Jesus' faithful people can expect God to give them a similar welcome when they meet him on the eternal day!

With the persecution we can expect to receive as Jesus' disciples (2 Timothy 3.12), we can also expect human disapproval. Soul-satisfying praise, however, awaits us in God's eternal presence. Do you work for God's praise or man's?





GDEF & GDRSD IMPLEMENT RESPONSIVE CLASSROOM PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT TO TEACH SOCIAL - EMOTIONAL SKILLS

Groton-Dunstable Schools Working to Improve Students' Social/Emotional Skills Thanks to \$50,000 Grant to GDEF from Middlesex Savings Bank

Buoyed by a \$50,000 grant from Middlesex Savings Bank in 2018, the Groton Dunstable Education Foundation (GDEF) is pleased to announce that it has funded the implementation of Responsive Classroom training in the Groton-Dunstable Regional School District. Responsive Classroom is an evidence-based approach to teaching that focuses on engaging academics, positive community, effective management, and developmental awareness. The program has been described by the Collaborative for Academic, Social, and Emotional Learning (CASEL) as among the most "well-designed evidence-based social and emotional learning (SEL) programs." Training began in the Groton-Dunstable Middle School in the 2018-19 school year and will extend into Swallow Union and Florence Roche in the 2019-20 school year.

GDEF's funding of this project began in 2018 with an initial grant of \$25,000 that allowed teachers at our Groton-Dunstable Middle School to participate in Responsive Classroom Training, led by Michelle Bensen. At this training, teachers learned how to implement strategies to create a classroom community that fosters collaboration, community, and social emotional learning. According to Caitlyn Morris, a sixth grade science teacher, "Many of us would like the opportunity to meet again either in the summer or during the school year. It would be great to form a professional learning community," demonstrating the success of the program in the GD Middle School.

Building on the success of this initial grant, GDEF has now awarded the GDRSD a second grant of \$25,000—making full use of Middlesex Savings Bank grant—to extend this program into the Florence Roche and Swallow Union Elementary Schools. As noted by Katie Novak, GDRSD Assistant Superintendent, "When students receive social emotional supports that are aligned with academic and behavioral efforts, they fare better on...academic achievement metrics, positive social behaviors and attitudes. We need to ensure that our teachers have a framework to support students with the key social emotional (SEL) competencies." During the 2019-20 academic year, all district's K-4 educators will have extensive training in social/emotional learning and ongoing support from experts in the fields of social/emotional learning.

GDEF's support of this initiative was made possible by the generosity of Middlesex Savings Bank and, as noted by Emily Davis, GDEF Board President, "Middlesex Savings Bank has been a wonderful partner in helping our organization to work with the district administration to build this new program." 

PEPPERELL FOOD PANTRY NOW OPEN TO DUNSTABLE RESIDENTS

PACH, Pepperell's food pantry, is now open to Dunstable residents in need. *The pantry, located at 66 Hollis Street in Pepperell, is open on Tuesdays from 5 to 7 p.m. and Thursdays from 2 to 4 p.m. and 5 to 7 p.m.*

PACH provides food and personal care items to residents of Pepperell and Dunstable in need of assistance. The pantry provides canned and boxed foods, frozen meats, and depending on availability, fresh fruits, vegetables, breads and dairy products. PACH clients may receive assistance from the pantry twice per month.

If you are interested in becoming a PACH client, please contact the office at 978-925-9770 or visit PACH's website, www.pachoutreach.org to learn how to receive assistance, and the required documentation for proof of residence in Pepperell or Dunstable.

Food Assistance Programs PACH also distributes food monthly on behalf of the USDA (U.S. Department of Agriculture) Food and Nutrition Programs, MEFAP (Massachusetts Emergency Food Assistance Program), and the Greater Boston Food Bank. Some of these programs have eligibility requirements, which can vary from year to year. PACH volunteers can help you determine whether you are eligible.

Resource Referrals PACH connects residents with public and private resources that can provide additional assistance – including SNAP (Supplementary Nutritional Assistance Program – aka Food Stamps), WIC (Women, Infants, and Children), the Salvation Army, local churches, and town departments. Our volunteers can help navigate applications and other paperwork. PACH is currently a designated TBD site for the SNAP program. Our trained volunteers will help you initiate the application process with the designated state agency. Referrals are available on an as-needed basis – please contact the office for more information.

Fuel Assistance The Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) provides income-based assistance for heating costs. Assistance is available for all fuel sources, including electric, oil. gas. and firewood.

Trained PACH volunteers help clients with the application and documentation process. Applications are then submitted to the designated agency for approval.

About PACH PACH, formed in 1974 as Pepperell Aid Church to Home and whose acronym now stands for Pepperell Aid Community to Home was first housed in the Knights of Columbus and local churches. As the demand for the food pantry has grown, PACH has had to move from location to location, relying on other organizations, such as Friends of the Seniors, to provide space and support. In 2017, PACH purchased the building at 66 Hollis Street in Pepperell and began the lengthy process of complete renovations. The new space allows clients to "shop" for their groceries in a clean. bright building with ample storage and parking. PACH's new home officially opened in November of 2018 and is now available to Dunstable residents. It is an entirely volunteer-led 501 (c) 3 non-profit organization. PACH serves over 300 individuals and families each month. Its clients include senior citizens, veterans, and children. High unemployment, the rising cost of food and fuel and reductions in state and federal aid have had a major impact on families.





BEAVER BROOK NATURE CENTER TURNS 55

Beaver Brook Association was founded in Hollis NH in 1964 by cousins Hollis Nichols and Jeff Smith. Starting with a 12 acre piece of property, the organization has grown to encompass 2,100 acres today. With 35 miles of trails, multiple classrooms, 14 theme gardens and year round programming, Beaver Brook teaches environmental education to nearly 15,000 people a year. Innumerable others visit the trails which are open free to the public 365 days a year. Trails allow hiking, running, snowshoeing, dogs on a leash. Some multipurpose trails at Beaver Brook permit mountain biking and horseback riding.

Beaver Brook is continuing its 43 year tradition of welcoming young people to explore, play and learn outdoors during summer. Teaching children about respect for the natural world and cultivating joy from engaging in healthy outdoor activities is a mission of Beaver Brook. Each session is a weeklong with a unique theme for students ages 4-15.

Classes include **Lavender to Lip Balm** which is a class on herbs, wild edibles and challenging your taste buds. Students will create herbal gummy bears, ginger cookies, herbal marshmallows and more. Herbs will be used to make dream pillows, compresses, and of course lip balm! The class ends with an English tea party in the Maple Hill gardens. Older students entering 5th-7th grade can learn about wild plants and trees and even take an archery lesson in a **Forest Foraging** class called **Hunter-Gatherers**.

Highly skilled teachers and naturalists teach programs for youngsters such as Earth Sprouts for preschoolers and Nature Nuts for 1st and 2nd graders.

Brook to Bay is a longstanding, classic Beaver Brook summer program. It focuses on all the aquatic habitats of New England. Students learn what lives in a vernal pool. They sample ponds, streams, rivers and take 2 field trips during the week. On the field trips they explore the Rocky Intertidal zone at Odiorne Point and on the last day enjoy a whale watch.

Landlubbers enjoy the quintessential Forest Forts class in which students design and build survival shelters and forts in the forest. They also learn navigating with a map and compass, wildlife tracking, and tree and plant identification. The goal is to have fun while learning how to respect and enjoy nature safely.



DOGS Vs LAWNS

Do you love your dog, but hate what s/he does to your nice green lawn? Well, you are not alone. All dogs can cause dead patches in the grass with their urine and/or stool. There are, however, some things you can do to help. The first step is to understand what is causing the problem. While both urine and stool can cause dead patches, urine is much worse for your lawn. Both urine and stool contain nitrogen, which is a waste product of protein metabolism. Stool contains less nitrogen, and is easier to pick up and remove.

Nitrogen itself is not bad for your lawn; in fact, it is a common ingredient in lawn fertilizer. It is the high *concentration* of nitrogen in urine which is the problem. Dog urine is basically super concentrated fertilizer and therefore causes the same lawn burn that occurs when you apply too much fertilizer. This is also why female dogs can cause more of a problem than males. Female dogs usually squat in one location, while some males will go smaller amounts in multiple locations.

One way to help decrease lawn burn is to try to dilute the affects of the nitrogen by watering the grass after your dog urinates. If you water within eight hours, you can actually achieve a fertilizer effect. Another option is to try to get your dog to consume more water, which will dilute the urine. Two easy ways to do this are to add water to dry food, or add canned food to your dog's diet, since canned food is 70-80% water.

The actual species of grass can affect the degree of lawn burn. Two grasses that do well are *Festuca* sp var *Kentucky* (fescue) and *Lolium perrene* (fine-bladed rye). Two grasses that do poorly are *Poa pretensis* (Kentucky bluegrass) and *Cynodon* sp var *fairway* (Bermuda grass).

Some people have suggested that the urine pH may cause lawn burn. This has been shown to be untrue. Many of the products marketed to control lawn burn modify your dog's urine pH. This is NOT a good idea. Not only is it not effective in controlling the problem, but changing the urinary pH can lead to bladder stones and/or infections.

Other, more time consuming options are to take your dog for walks instead of letting him/her urinate on the lawn. Some people have set up specific locations in their yard with stone or gravel or cement and taught their dogs to go in these locations. This can be difficult, but with a little patience and perseverance it can be done.

Your last option, and my personal favorite, is to learn to put up with a slightly imperfect lawn in exchange for a wonderful, loyal, loving dog. Now, if we could only teach them to pick up their own feces.

HEAT SAFETY

Never leave children or pets in your vehicle. The inside temperature of the car can quickly reach 120 degrees.

Stay hydrated, drink plenty of fluids. Avoid drinks with caffeine or alcohol. Wear loose-fitting, lightweight, light-colored clothing. Avoid dark colors as they absorb the sun's rays. Avoid extreme temperature changes. Slow down, stay indoors. Avoid strenuous exercise during the hottest part of the day. Postpone outdoor games and activities. Use a buddy system when working in excessive heat. Take frequent breaks if working outdoors. Check on family, friends and neighbors who do not have air conditioning, who spend much of their time alone or who are more likely to be affected by the heat.
