## TOWN OF TYNGSBOROUGH UPDATES

The Town of Tyngsborough continues to work closely with our partners on the State level to monitor and respond to the current COVID-19 pandemic. We are continuously providing new information to our residents via social media and our website at <a href="http://www.tyngsboroughma.gov">www.tyngsboroughma.gov</a>. Here are a few updates:

• As of June 8, 2020, the Board of Selectmen have implemented a rapid review and approval process to allow restaurants to commence outdoor seating where they had not previously had such seating. To date, nearly a dozen restaurants have taken advantage of this no-cost review process and are open for outdoor seating.

• Town Offices reopened to the public on June 10. The traffic flow has been modified to provide for one way traffic, hand sanitizer units have been installed throughout the building, and sneeze shields were installed at every transaction point to protect the health and safety of our employees and residents. Additionally, per order of the Governor, all members of the public are required to wear a mask upon entering the building as are employees. Employees are not required to wear a mask if alone in their office.

• The Tyngsborough Public Library has reopened for curbside pickup only. More information about this service and other service updates can be found by calling 978-649-7361 or on the web at tynglib.org

• On June 22, 2020, Phase 2.2 commenced allowing indoor dining with certain restrictions. Our Health Agent, Building Commissioner, Fire Department, and Board of Selectmen have worked collaboratively to help restaurants open their indoor seating areas as quickly as possible while ensuring compliance with state and local mandates.

#### **TYNGSBOROUGH BOARD OF HEALTH** With the arrival of summer weather, and as COVID-19 related

With the arrival of summer weather, and as COVID-19 related restrictions on daily activities begin to lift, Tyngsborough Board of Health and the Massachusetts Department of Public Health (DPH) reminds residents of the recommended precautions to keep families safe this summer.

#### PREVENT TICK BITES

• Ticks can make you sick when they bite you. They are most commonly found in grassy, brushy, or wooded areas. They only attach when you come into direct contact with them - they cannot jump or fly. Follow these steps if you live, work, or spend time in areas where ticks are present:

• Check yourself for ticks once a day - it's the single most important thing you can do.

• Use repellents that contain DEET on your exposed skin and those that contain permethrin on your clothes.

• When walking or hiking, stick to main pathways and the center of trails if you can. Brushing against tall grass and bushes will increase your exposure to ticks.

• Weather permitting, wear long-sleeved, light-colored shirts and long pants tucked into socks. This will help keep ticks away from your skin and make it easier to spot ticks on your clothing.

• Because dogs and horses are particularly susceptible, talk to your veterinarian about the best ways to protect your animals from tick-borne disease.

#### PREVENT MOSQUITO BITES

The 2019 mosquito season was an active season for Eastern Equine Encephalitis (EEE) in Massachusetts. This mosquito-borne illness appears generally in 2-3 year cycles, traditionally peaking during August. While the risk for human infection of EEE or West Nile Virus won't happen until later this summer, people have an important role to play in protecting themselves from these illnesses which can be very serious. To prepare for mosquito season:

• Drain standing water in and around your house or yard to prevent mosquito breeding.

• Repair window and door screens to keep mosquitoes out of your home.

• Use a mosquito repellent with an EPA-registered ingredient according to the directions on the label.

 Wear clothing to reduce exposed skin when weather permits. For more information about preventing mosquito and tickborne illness, visit <u>www.mass.gov/mosquitoesandticks</u>.



# PLANNING FOR A CHILD WITH A DISABILITY

As a parent of a child with a disability you may be anxious when thinking about your passing. It requires careful thought and planning. The choices available may impact not only your child with a disability but your other children and grandchildren. The needs of the child with a disability must be considered but the needs and desires of the other family members cannot be overlooked.

You will want to consider the government benefits available for your child and ensure that your planning will allow those to continue. Benefits like SSI and Medicaid are asset-based, so you won't want your child to inherit unrestricted assets. You may need a Supplemental Needs Trust (often called a Special Needs Trust or SNT) for your child.

Depending on the size of your estate, you may need to consider how to divide your assets among your children. The child with a disability may need more, but you may not want to take some away from the other children. You might want to purchase life insurance (with the SNT named as beneficiary) to provide more assets for your child.

You may not want to burden your other children with care duties, but they may want to take on that responsibility. You need to review the future care-giving options and discuss them with all concerned. You don't want to leave your other children with a burden that they are not willing or able to handle. There are organizations that can help you, so you should seek out that assistance while you still have time to plan and choose what is right for your child.

If you think that your other children may want to be caregivers for your child with a disability, then you should discuss this thoroughly. Think about the possible affects on their lives, such as family dynamics, spouses, grandchildren, living arrangements and the like. A sibling may want to provide care but may not have thought out the full ramifications of being a full-time caregiver.

Beyond possible living and care arrangements for your child, you will need to consider who should have legal and financial authority to handle your child's affairs. Do you want one or more of your other children to be Trustees of the SNT? Do you want them to handle the medical-decision-making for your child? Will a guardian need to be appointed (now or in the future) or can your child with a disability make decisions without need for a guardian, and if so, are a Power of Attorney and Health Care Proxy the right tools to use?

You should seek out whatever help you may need to figure out your plan. An Elder Law Attorney can help with legal planning, but you may need a social worker or care manager to help with personal living and care choices. Your local Agency for disabilities may have resources for you so do not fail to find out how to contact that organization.

# BE SUMMER-SAVVY

Summer brings a lot of fun and a lot of health and safety challenges. Take a few minutes to be safe and healthy.

- Use U.S. Coast Guard-approved life jackets on the water.
- Put on sunscreen and a wide-brimmed hat to protect your skin from the sun.
- · Drink plenty of water even if you don't feel thirsty.
- Put on insect repellent.

• Wash your hands often.

#### Beat the Heat and Sun

Heat-related illness happens when the body's temperature control system is overloaded. <u>Infants and children</u> up to 4 years of age are at greatest risk. Even young and healthy people can get sick from the heat if they participate in strenuous physical activities during hot weather. For heat-related illness, <u>the best defense is prevention</u>.

• Never leave infants, children, or pets in a parked car, even if the windows are cracked open.

• Dress infants and children in loose, lightweight, light-colored clothing.

 Šchedule outdoor activities carefully, for morning and evening hours.

Stay cool with cool showers or baths.

• Seek medical care immediate if your child has <u>symptoms of heat-related illness</u>.

Just a few serious sunburns can increase you and your child's risk of <u>skin cancer</u> later in life. Their skin needs protection from the sun's harmful ultraviolet (UV) rays whenever they're outdoors. • Cover up. Clothing that covers your and your child's skin helps protect against UV rays.

 Use sunscreen with at least SPF (sun protection factor) 15 and UVA (ultraviolet A) and UVB (ultraviolet B) protection every time you and your child go outside.

#### Make Summer Safe for Kids

Summer is a great time for kids to enjoy different indoor and outdoor activities. Whether they are young children or teens, learn ways to keep your kids safe and healthy while they enjoy the summer fun.

#### Master water safety

 Water-related activities are popular for getting physical activity and have many <u>health benefits</u>. Here are some tips to stay safe while having fun.

• Learn how to prevent <u>recreational water illnesses</u> and help protect yourself and your kids.

· Help kids get H2O Smartz about water safety.

Drownings are the leading cause of injury/death for young children ages 1-4, and three children die every day as a result of <u>drowning</u>.
Always supervise children when in or around water. A responsible adult should constantly watch young children.

• Teach kids to swim. Formal swimming lessons can protect young children from drowning.

• Learn cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR). Your CPR skills could save someone's life.

• Install a four-sided fence around home pools.

<u>Recreational boating</u> can be a wonderful way to spend time with family and friends. Make boating safety a priority.

Wear a properly fitted life jacket every time you and your loved ones are on the water.

#### A NOTE FROM Barbara Roche

As I come upon my 9<sup>th</sup> Anniversary as Director of Elder Services for the Town of Tyngsborough, I reflect on the many changes that have occurred over the years. This PANDEMIC has sure put a wrench in everyone's plans!!!

The Senior Center has not been open to the public since March 13<sup>th</sup>. We are still providing Meals on Wheels for about 35 home bound seniors. Our volunteers follow safety protocols during the deliveries. Our outreach coordinator is still available for help with applications, questions regarding care, and the growing needs of our elder population. Our van service is operational. Again, safety protocols are in place when the van is in use.

• According to the Governor's Phased Reopening Plan, and if (and only if) there are no setbacks in the progress made in the state during Phase 4, we would be 'open' to the public with RESTRIC-TIONS. Phase 4 has a date of July 20, 2020. Like I said, depends on the current situation if this will happen at that time.

So, as we 'slowly' reopen and try to get back to a new 'normal', **we will not be holding any special events or activities in July**. Stay tuned for the reopening plan and the timing of when we start classes in the exercise room and games.

• Don't toss that junk mail in the recycling bin just yet - it might contain your stimulus check in the form of a prepaid debit card. Some 4 million Americans are getting governmentissued economic-impact cards in plain white envelopes, which some people have thrown away by mistake. Don't throw away that junk mail - or you might throw away your stimulus payment. The U.S. Treasury Department and the Internal Revenue Service began sending out Economic Impact Payments as prepaid debit cards last week. So almost 4 million Americans still waiting for their cut of the \$2.2 trillion CARES Act can expect to get their stimulus money in the form of an EIP Card, as opposed to a paper check. Problem is, these Visa cards are being issued by MetaBank (the Treasury's financial agent) and delivered in plain envelopes from Money Network Cardholder Services - neither of which is a familiar name for most of us. So reports of people mistaking these for preapproved credit-card junk mail, or even a scam, have been popping up across the country. And, in some cases, people have even thrown away the debit cards containing their long-awaited stimulus money before they realized their mistake.

#### CURBSIDE EDUCATION CAMPAIGN

The Town of Tyngsborough was recently awarded the MassDEP Recycling IQ grant. This grant funds education efforts to help residents understand what can and cannot be recycled in our curbside program. Our goal is to keep contamination out of the Recycling stream - particularly plastic bags, which should NEVER be placed in your recycling cart.

Why does it matter what you throw in the Recycling cart? Single stream recycling has lulled many people into believing that "someone" at the sorting facility will happily accept whatever materials are placed in the magic blue bin and find some way to turn them into new things. This is called **wish-cycling** and it does more harm than good. When we wish-cycle, we slow things down at the processing facility, drive up costs and potentially endanger workers at the facility.

Residents have told us they are confused about what should and should not be placed in the recycling carts. Starting in early July, residents will receive information about Recycling IQ and new learning tools - a magnet for the fridge and an updated weather-proof sticker for the top of the recycling cart. We will also begin auditing recycling carts for contamination. **Carts that are found to be contaminated will be tagged with an explanation of the problem and rejected at the curb. Once the issue is corrected, the cart will be emptied during the following recycling pick-up. We know it will be difficult for you if we reject your cart. We also know that recycling has become increasingly complex in recent years and we are now strengthening our education efforts to keep up with this growing complexity.** 

Please visit the Town website or <u>RecycleSmartMA.org</u> for information about what types of items are accepted in our curbside recycling program. We believe deeply in diverting waste whenever possible. But, unless you are certain that something is recyclable, please put it in the trash instead. **Think: "When in doubt, throw it out!"** Please contact the Sustainability Committee if you have any questions about this new initiative. Thank you for doing your part to Recycle Smart.

# NDA PLANNING TO FULLY OPEN FOR ALL GRADES IN SEPTEMBER

Tyngsboro, MA – The Academy of Notre Dame (NDA) announced today that based on current federal, state and local agency directives, the Academy is preparing to start the new school year on campus for all grades without the need for a blended schedule. The first day for school for all grades will be September 2, 2020. "Small class size has always been part of NDA's model for academic excellence and accelerated growth," said NDA Head of School Dr. Vittoria Pacifico. "We are blessed to have generously sized classrooms that allow for social distancing. Our large campus coupled with our small class sizes helps reduce health risks to students and faculty alike. "

Dr. Pacifico also noted that the Academy is looking to leverage its 220+ acre campus to create outdoor learning spaces so that faculty may take instruction outside, weather permitting, to help further reduce the risk of spreading the coronavirus.

Over the summer, the Academy is convening a reentry task force of NDA staff and outside professionals and community leaders to review and implement the reentry policies and procedures. "As a school community we want to be well prepared to safely welcome students back on to campus. The school has invested in an electrostatic fogger to quickly sanitize and disinfect restrooms, classrooms and equipment on campus. "Should the pandemic cause another school closure, we'll be ready to transfer our academic excellence to our distance learning program as we did this spring. Thankfully, we didn't miss one day of learning at NDA and will be prepared to provide the same service again if necessary," noted Dr. Pacifico. #### Northeast TOBACCO FREE Community Partnership

As of June 1<sup>st</sup>, 2020, flavored tobacco, including menthol cigarettes like Kools and Newports, will no longer be sold in Massachusetts stores. Last fall, the Fight All Flavors campaign and supporting partners worked to build grassroots understanding of a proposed flavored tobacco restriction that called out the tobacco and nicotine industries' targeting of menthol in communities of color.

The tobacco and vaping industries have targeted youth, LGBTQ populations and communities of color with their deadly products, causing many health consequences for these populations. Flavors, like mint and menthol, are a leading reason that young people start vaping and using tobacco.

The law, which goes into effect on June 1, 2020, means that: Menthol cigarettes and all other flavored tobacco products like flavored cigars, flavored chewing tobacco, and flavored e-cigarettes and nicotine vaping products will no longer be widely available in Massachusetts.

E-cigarettes and nicotine vaping products will increase in price. I'm excited to see that **No Menthol Know Why** builds on that work. I work with community-based organizations, youth advocates, public health and health care partners, churches, and more to support the communities most impacted by the new law. We all want to build awareness about the law and provide information about the resources available to help people quit smoking.


