

DUNSTABLE - A JOURNEY BACK IN TIME

First impressions are often lasting ones. As I approached Dunstable, Massachusetts, via Route 113 for the first time one May day in 1972, I had the sense that I was stepping back into history. My family and I had just escaped the traffic clogged expressways and handkerchief sized residential lots of heavily populated Long Island, NY. As we drove past the Entering Dunstable sign, our car slowed down as did our way of life. I did a double take as we passed a one room red schoolhouse with two outhouses. That was my first clue that this place was different. As we drove toward the center of Dunstable, I was delighted with the quaint stone walls, the over-hanging trees and woody surroundings, the tiny old cemetery nestled off to the right and the sparse traffic on the narrow, winding road. The peaceful, rural atmosphere suggested that here was a place that was as yet untouched by the onslaught of modernization and overdevelopment. It was like stepping into a time-warp where we were suddenly whisked back into the past.

My fascination continued as we approached a farm sporting a large cow's head over the barn door and with many cows grazing in the fields beyond. There was a horse farm across the street. The "thickly settled" sign down the road made us chuckle when we realized that a thickly settled area was no more than two or three houses clustered together. Next, we passed another larger cemetery before coming to the picturesque white church and town hall that seemed to be the town's center. The stone watering trough at the bend in the road, the tiny post office, and the volunteer fire department were further evidence that here the past was treasured and respected. Things had pretty much remained the same over the years. Life was not hurried here. What a delight to find such a place after the frantic pace of Long Island, New York.

That sense of history that I felt from my first ride into town has never left me. The many stone walls everywhere, even deep in an isolated woods, make one think of the men who built them years ago as they tried to clear the land and establish property boundaries. That these walls still stand after 200-300 years is humbling, a monument to the men who built them. One senses that Dunstable's big old trees with branches hanging out over the roads and the woodlands could tell many tales about the pioneers and Indians who once hunted among these leafy branches. Just stepping into a wooded area is like intruding on the past. Whose feet once walked these woods? The ghosts of other times linger all around. Finding the remains of an old house foundation and fireplace and wooden milk bucket really sets the imagination soaring.

Dunstable's narrow, winding roads follow the original wagon paths right up to the front doors of the farmhouses and often intercept the house and barn. Meeting an on-coming car on such a road often requires pulling your car as far to the right as possible and sometimes stopping until the other car passes by with a wave from the driver. The bumping and jostling of the roads keeps speed down and often makes the driver feel akin to those who once drove wagons over these roads before they were paved. It's a far cry from eight lane expressways.

Many big old homes connect right to the barns by way of a series of lower attached rooms which must have been used for storing and mending carriages or riding equipment, or for a place for storing animal feed or stacking up firewood. The fact that a farmer could eventually reach the barn from his house through this connector makes one wonder about the fierceness of the winters many years ago. People must have really burrowed in until Spring. The architecture of the homes is a tribute to the ingenuity of the early settlers.

The many barns and wide fields remaining in Dunstable not only reveals a former way of life, but also suggests that present day life here is still intertwined with the land and the seasons. There are only a few large working farms today, but people still enjoy keeping cows and horses and putting out large vegetable gardens. Wildlife

is abundant everywhere. From my own kitchen window, I have seen skunks, squirrels, racoons, groundhogs, deer, pheasants, hawks, ducks, foxes and a "V" formation of wild geese flies over the house twice daily. Bluebirds almost extinct from this area are being coaxed back to nesting in our fields. Just like earlier settlers, Dunstable's residents still live close to nature. What a gift to be able to do so

There are other daily reminders of days gone by. The little red schoolhouse on the outskirts of town, preserved by the local historical society, shows us what the first area schools were like. The Union School in the town's center with its entrance hall, four high-ceiling classrooms with attached coat rooms, and the twostory boxlike structure reveals what followed after the one-room schoolhouse. The church with its clock and steeple and the bell that rings every hour, year after year, the millstone in the town field, and the old town hall further displays a glimpse into the past. The watering trough in the town's center serves as a reminder that there were once enough horses passing through to make this a necessary stop. A walk among the tombstones at the Central Cemetery or smaller Dunstable burial grounds tells us that life and death have been going on here for over 300 years. What a privilege it was to stand at the end of Hillcrest Street with my young family one sunny day in 1973 watching the small parade with Clydesdale horses that celebrated the town's 300th birthday. I had a strong sense that this little town was certainly worth celebrating.

Some of the events taking place in Dunstable each year also link the town to the past. One of these events is the annual town meeting where voters have the opportunity to discuss and vote on important town matters by a show of hands. Town elections still follow the method of cranking individual ballots through an antique wooden election box and hand counting all the ballots to determine tallies. The aura of by-gone school days is savored at the little red schoolhouse each June when the Strawberry Festival presents a festive day to enjoy seasonal strawberries and a display of New England handicrafts. A late summer grange fair not only gives local gardeners a chance to display the bounty of their harvest, but also brings citizens together in a day of friendly competition and fellowship.

The charm of this small rural New England town known as Dunstable, named after Dunstable, England, is the very history that surrounds it. Its citizens work together to preserve that charm. They value their ties to the past and mean to keep them. Their efforts make this town a wonderful place to call home. Let's hope it never changes.

Answers to Flu Clinic FAQ: -Pre-registration is required using the links posted to the website at https://www.nashoba.org/calendar. Because there are different vaccine formulations for different age groups, registration links are divided by age group. Please select the link for the correct clinic location and your age group to register. Appointment times are 'placeholders' so please let folks know if the particular time slot they are looking for is not available, to still sign up and we will take them at clinic anytime

-Flu clinics are open to the public (ages 6 months and up). **Residents of Nashoba towns can attend any clinic in the region**. -When registering, please note: You may see a list of other clinic locations, but only one can be selected- the "Book Here" button for the correct clinic will be purple, while the others will be greyed out. -People should bring their insurance cards to the clinic. -No insurance? No problem. A person that does not have insurance may still receive a vaccination. -There will be high dose flu vaccine available for those age 65 years and older -We ask anyone feeling sick to stay home

Well Adult Clinics will resume in November. If we have remaining flu vaccine, we will bring it to November's Well Adult Clinics.



DUNSTABLE PLANNING BOARD

At Town Meeting in May of 1995, The Town of Dunstable voted to designate certain streets as scenic roads within the meaning of "Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 40, Section 15C: <u>Scenic road designations; improvements; fines"</u>

The law states: "After a road has been designated as a scenic road any repair, maintenance, reconstruction, or paving work done with respect thereto shall not involve or include the cutting or removal of trees, or the tearing down or destruction of stone walls, or portions thereof, except with the prior written consent of the planning board..."

Please review page 83 of the Town's General Bylaws to see if your street is considered scenic and go to the Planning Board's Forms page for the necessary Scenic Road Request form and instructions for submission. An applicant must request a Scenic Roads hearing and authorization prior to any roadside alterations on their property. 

DUNSTABLE BOARD OF HEALTH RECYCLING NEWS

On November 1, 2022, the Mass. Department of Environmental Protection put a ban on textiles being disposed of in the trash. Textiles are described as clothing, footwear, bedding, towels, curtains, fabric, and similar products.

HOMESTEAD PROTECTION

If you owe someone money, with a court order, they can seize your assets to pay that debt, including your home. But Massachusetts Homestead law protects homeowners from being thrown into the street. Every homeowner gets \$125,000 of protection on their home. By filing a Homestead Declaration at the Registry of Deeds. you can increase that protection to \$500,000. In the old days the husband usually filed, now the law is gender neutral and both parties to a marriage (or other joint homeowners) can file for Homestead. There is another protection available only to a married couple and that is called "Tenancy by the Entirety." This older law protected wives from the debts of the husband. It is now gender neutral as well and protects either spouse from the debts of the other. It is recommended that every Massachusetts homeowner file a Declaration of Homestead. (Neither of these laws exist in New Hampshire by the way.)

It is rare that your home would be at risk to creditors, but it could happen. Liability for an accident and other personal financial disasters are the most likely problems. In that case you might be filing for bankruptcy protection. The \$500,000 Homestead exemption would protect your home in bankruptcy. And, even if you had equity above that limit, the creditor could only get a lien on your home and only get paid if and when you sell (or die). The law protects you from being homeless.

A recent case shows some of the limits of Homestead though. In re: Cecilia M. Hector (Mass. Bankruptcy case - 2022) the wife tried to get a gas company lien removed from her property because it was only the debt of her husband, and the house was owned as Tenants by the Entirety. The Court said that she did not owe the debt but that the lien could stay on the house and the Gas Company could get paid when the house was sold as it was a valid debt of the husband. The Tenancy by the Entirety and the prior-filed Homestead Declaration would protect from a forced sale, but not from a lien that would wait until a voluntary sale (that first \$500.000 in equity would not be subject to pay that lien though).

Another key issue is with the specific words in the Homestead Declaration. The State does provide some blank forms for your use, but you can write out a Declaration in any way as long as the right words are there. It must be signed, and the facts stated must be affirmed under the penalty of perjury (meaning you are swearing the facts are true). Some older forms, or a homemade form, might be missing that "under penalty of perjury" language so they would not be valid. In the case of Danny Luu (Mass. Bankruptcy, 2022), that homeowner lost as his declaration was missing that key language. He was still entitled to the \$125,000 automatic protection but did not get the full \$500,000 protection he might have had if his declaration form was valid.

FINANCIAL FOCUS® What to know about HSAs and FSAs

Paying for health care can be challenging — but are you taking full advantage of all the resources available to you? You might have access to a Health Savings Account (HSA) or a Flexible Spending Account (FSA), so let's look at both.

An HSA is a personal savings account used to pay health care costs. If you're enrolled in a high-deductible health plan, you also may be eligible to contribute to an HSA. You aren't taxed on the money you put into this account or on the earnings generated from your contributions, as long as withdrawals are used for qualified health care costs such as deductibles, copayments and coinsurance. And there's no "use it or lose it" provision with HSAs — the money stays in your account until you use it. In fact, you can carry your HSA with you all the way until retirement, when you can use the money to pay for qualified expenses that Medicare or Medicare Supplement Insurance (Medigap) doesn't cover. In 2023, you can contribute up to \$3,850 to an HSA, or \$4,850 if you're 55 or older; for family coverage, you can put in up to \$7,750.

It's important to keep in mind that your HSA's tax benefits only apply when your withdrawals are used for qualified heath care costs. If you use the money for non-qualified expenses, it is considered taxable income, and you may also face a penalty of 20% on the amount withdrawn. However, once you turn 65, you can use your HSA funds for any purpose without a penalty, though the withdrawals will still count as taxable income.

Now, let's turn to the Flexible Savings Account. An FSA may be available to you if you get health insurance through your employer. And because you fund your FSA with pretax dollars, your contributions can reduce your taxable income. (In 2023, you can contribute up to \$3,050 to an FSA.) Your employer may also choose to contribute to your FSA. Once your account is funded and active, you submit claims with proof of your medical expenses, along with a statement that these expenses aren't covered by your plan, and you can be reimbursed for your costs.

It's helpful to have a good estimate of your yearly medical expenses for a Flexible Savings Account. That's because an FSA generally needs to be spent before the end of the plan year — if you don't use all the money, you can only carry over some of it and any remaining balance is forfeited. (You can carry over up to \$610 from 2023 into 2024.)

You can't contribute to an HSA and a traditional FSA in the same year. But if you have an HSA, you might be able to use what's known as a Limited Purpose Flexible Spending Account (LPFSA) for dental and vision expenses. You'll need to check with your plan to see if this option is available.

Managing your health care expenses should be a key part of your overall financial strategy — so consider putting an HSA or FSA to work for you.



TYNGSBOROUGH POLICE OFFER HALLOWEEN SAFETY TIPS

During Halloween festivities Chief Richard D. Howe and the Tyngsborough Police Department ask that the community put safety first, especially for those who plan on trick-or-treating or who will be out at night. Halloween, which is celebrated on Oct. 31st, falls on a Tuesday this year. "This holiday is sure to be a fun time for all, whether you're out in your neighborhood gathering candy, or celebrating with friends at home," Chief Howe said. "No matter your choice of activity, always remember to put safety first."

The Centers for Disease Control provides best practices for Halloween trick-or-treaters by asking that people follow the "Safe Halloween" motto. • Swords, knives and other costume accessories should be short, soft and flexible. • Avoid trick-or-treating alone. Walk in groups or with a trusted adult. • Fasten reflective tape on costumes and bags to help drivers see you. • Examine all treats for choking hazards and tampering before you eat them. • Hold a flashlight while walking to ensure that you are visible. • Walk and don't run from house to house. • Always test make up in a small area first. Remove it before bedtime to prevent possible skin and eve irritation. • Lower your risk of serious eye injury by not wearing decorative contact lenses. • Look both ways before crossing the street. Use established crosswalks wherever possible. • Only walk on sidewalks wherever possible, or on the far edge of the road facing traffic to stay safe and to prevent accidents or injury. Wear well-fitting masks, costumes and shoes to avoid blocked vision, trips and falls. • Eat only factory-wrapped candy. Avoid eating homemade treats offered by strangers. • Enter homes only if you're with a trusted adult. Only visit well-lit houses. Don't accept rides from strangers.• Never walk near lit candles or devices with open flames. Be sure to wear flame-resistant costumes.

Those who are planning on attending a party should remember:• Many young children are out for the evening, especially during the peak hours of 6:00-8:00 p.m., so drive slowly! • Not to drive a vehicle while wearing any sort of mask. Your visibility could be obscured.• To have a designated driver if attending an adult Halloween party where alcohol is served.
