

TYNGSBOROUGH'S TOWN MANAGER REPORT

From Colin Loiselle, Tyngsborough Town Manager <u>December 2023</u>

I am pleased to report the following information from Town over the last month. You can find a full version of the Town Manager's report online at <u>tyngsboroughma.gov</u>• A contract for the hazardous material abatement of the Winslow School located at 250 Middlesex Road was awarded to Green Environmental last month. The bid came in under budget and work under this contract will commence right away. The project involves a complete abatement of all hazardous material including asbestos which is prominent across the building.

• The Town Manger's Office has contracted with SOCOTEC Architects to design the partial demolition and relocation of the Winslow School as approved by Article 24 on the May 2023 Annual Town Meeting Warrant. We expect to have design complete with construction documents and hard construction estimates prepared in early Spring.

• The 2023 Roads Project has wrapped up for the winter. Work under this contract included a full-depth reclamation of Patriot Road and Descheneaux Lane. To date, reclamation, grading, and binder coat work have been completed on Patriot Road and Descheneaux. In the Spring, the contractor will install the final coat on both roads.

• In November, a contract was awarded to T Ford for the installation of the pedestrian bridge and observation deck over Flint Pond. Work under this contract is expected to be completed by June 30.

• The Town's new yard waste drop off site had a successful first season with no issues regarding illegal dumping. The site will close for the winter on December 9 and reopen on April 2. In the event that we get unseasonably warm weather and conditions permit, the Town may open the site periodically throughout the winter, please stay tuned to the Town website for announcements.

• The Fall Special Town Meeting on October 24, 2023 generated over 300 residents. In total, 7 articles and 3 citizen petitions were considered. All 7 town-sponsored articles were approved and the three citizens petitions did not pass. Annual Town Meeting will take place on Tuesday, May 7, 2024 at 7PM at the Elementary School.

• Work on the Bicentennial Field Irrigation Project will commence this spring. Bids for this project were due in November. The work will see the installation of a pump in Bridgemeadow Brook which will divert water to the Bicentennial Fields to be used for irrigation. This will reduce the Town's reliance on municipal water which has become costly. The Town expects to save \$50,000 annually thanks to this project.

REAL ESTATE TAX EXEMPTIONS AVAILABLE

You may be eligible to receive a property tax exemption if you fall into any of these categories: Legally blind person; Veteran with a service-connected disability; Surviving spouse of a disabled veteran or veteran who died from active-duty injury or illness; Senior citizen age 65 and older, who meets income and asset requirements.

You must have owned and occupied your property as of 7/1/2023. Supporting documentation is required for all exemption applications. Applications are available at the Assessors Office in Town Hall, or at www.tyngsboroughma.gov/departments/assessors. Applications for FY2024 are due to the Assessors Office by April 1, 2024. SCAMS TARGETING THE ELDERLY By Edward H. Adamsky

There are always scams targeting the elderly. Older persons are more likely to have issues with memory and processing thoughts quickly and can more easily be tricked. Even younger folks can be taken in by a clever scammer. Social Security and Medicare have recently issued warnings about a new round of scams.

The key is that almost all government agencies and elder service agencies never call you directly. They usually communicate by regular mail. They would never call you and ask you for information that they already have like your Social Security Number or your Medicare number. If you get such a call, hang up and don't answer if they call back.

Anyone who calls demanding any sort of immediate payment or threatens you with jail is a scammer. You would have sufficient notice by mail or legal service of process if you owed money or if you were accused of a crime that might put you in jail. You wouldn't get a phone call about that sort of thing at all. If they were really going to arrest you, the police would just show up and do so, they don't give you a chance to pay them off first.

No government agency nor credible social service agency will ask you to pay with a gift card or to wire them money. Those are always a fraud. You should never give out any personal information to anyone who calls you. If you call an agency or company directly, they may ask you for some proof of identity, but most have some way of doing so without you having to give your SSN or other highly private information.

If you are suspicious about a call, just hang up the phone. Look up the purported caller's phone number and call that agency directly to see if they do need to communicate with you. Some scams come by email, so be careful not to click on any links in emails that you don't clearly know are from the actual agency. Always try to look at the return email address. You might have to click on the address bar area of the email, but scam emails often have a long string of numbers or a source that clearly isn't the agency they pretend to be.

Older adults who are targeted by scams and fraud can call the Department of Justice's National Elder Fraud Hotline at 833-372-8311. In addition, scams and fraud targeting people of any age can be reported to the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) by calling 877-382-4357 or visiting reportfraud.ftc.gov.

TYNGSBOROUGH'S YARD WASTE DROP-OFF SITE! There will no longer be Yard Waste Pick Ups.

The Residential Yard Waste Drop Off Site is located across the street from Town Hall, 25 Bryants Lane. The site is located off Bryant's Lane, closer to the Middlesex Road end. *This location is* a town-owned parcel located directly behind (but not part of) the Bell Conservation property. Use of this Yard Waste Drop-Off Site is available to residents only, is free and usage is unlimited during operating hours. Vehicles will enter & exit through the same driveway. Look for the signage on Bryants Lane.

Open daily Tuesday through Friday 7:30 AM - 3:30 PM Saturday 8:30 AM - 3:30 PM <u>The site will close the second</u> <u>Saturday in December (weather permitting) and will reopen on</u> <u>the first Tuesday in April.</u>

Please note that the Town will close the site during heavy rain events or snow events. Notices about changes of hours due to weather events will be posted on the Town website & social media.

Yard waste may be dumped from any type of container **or left in paper leaf bags**. No items should be left in anything other than paper bags. If transporting the yard waste via plastic bag or barrel, please dump directly onto the ground. Signs will point you to where to leave the yard waste. Your cooperation in keeping the site orderly is appreciated.



Winter Wildlife Reminders!

Leaving a few piles of leaves/brush along the edge of your yard can provide for many species of pollinators, birds, reptiles and small mammals during the colder months. Allowing some leaves to remain in your yard provides cover and insulation to overwintering insects like moths and butterflies. The decomposing leaves also provide nutrients to your grass and gardens.

Not cleaning up your perennial beds can provide a boost to birds and insects. Not all birds migrate south for the winter and those that remain can survive on natural foods. Pollinators can make use of the hollow stems and other parts of the plant during the winter.

Watch for wildlife on the roads! Breeding season for white-tailed deer goes through early December. Be mindful of the increase in deer activity during early morning and evening hours.

All outdoor users who are in the woods during hunting season should wear blaze orange clothing pieces as well. Hunting season is still in full swing so keep pets on leash and visible. Make your presence known like talking loud or whistling to identify yourself as a person. But be courteous not to make unnecessary noise to disturb wildlife or hunting as hunter harassment is against the law.

Happier Holidays and Emptier Trash Carts The holiday season means both cherished time spent with family and friends and, at the same time, a hectic, frenzied rush to get everything done. There are presents to wrap, cookies and pies to bake, bathrooms to clean, merry to make and before you know it, the trash cart is overflowing! It's no wonder that Americans throw out 25% more trash between Thanksgiving and New Years than any other time of the year.

Here are some tips to help you save both your sanity and space in the trash cart:

1. Pre-Holiday Clean Out - Take a weekend before the hustle and bustle sets in to purge items you no longer need or want. Schedule a home pick up with a charitable partner, like Big Brother, Big Sister to donate unwanted household items and toys that are still in good shape. Clothing & Textiles (in any condition) can be dropped off at the expanded Recycling Center at the Tyngsborough Highway Dept, 89 Kendall Road.

2. Twin the Bins - When hosting family and friends, place an indoor recycling bucket in plain sight near the trash barrel. You'll make it easy for those visiting to keep recycling out of the trash, without having to ask where you keep your recycling bin.

3. Use Up Those Leftovers - Cooking for Christmas Eve and visiting the next day? Why not make a plan to reimagine the leftovers to bring something the next day? Leftover Prime Rib makes an amazing chili and Roast Turkey makes a great filling for pot pie. If that's not feasible, buy some extra reusable plastic containers and send the leftovers home with your guests! Even better, save and wash plastic food ingredient containers for reuse and then recycle.

4. Save gift bags and boxes for use next year. Everything is more expensive these days. Save gift packaging to use again (and again). It's like getting a BOGO deal you never expected.



When the cold weather comes, this is the time I enjoy baking more. I haven't put any recipes in for awhile so I thought I would share this very simple one with you. It has been a favorite of mine for years. Sometimes I change things up, using other dried fruits and adding in some nuts.

VANISHING OATMEAL RAISIN COOKIES

- 1/2 cup (1 stick) plus 6 tbsp. butter, softened
- 3/4 cup firmly packed brown sugar
- 1/2 cup granulated sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 ¹/₂ cups all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon salt (optional)

3 cups Quaker (\mathbb{R}) Oats (quick or old fashioned, uncooked) 1 cup raisins

1. Heat oven to 350 degrees F. In large bowl, beat butter and sugars on medium speed of electric mixer until creamy.

- 2. Add eggs and vanilla; beat well.
- 3. Add combined flour, baking soda, cinnamon and salt; mix well.
- 4. Add oats and raisins; mix well.

Drop dough by rounded tablespoonfuls onto ungreased cookie sheets.

Bake 8-10 minutes or until light golden brown. Cool 1 minutes on cookie sheets; remove to wire rack. Cool completely. Store tightly covered. Makes about 4 dozen cookies.

• Household Linens Clean sheets, comforters (not down), quilts, blankets, towels (worn is okay), shower curtains, new shower liners. It is very helpful to us if bedding is labeled with size. <u>We do not</u> <u>accept</u> Duvet covers, down comforters, used shower curtain liners, valences, curtains, mini-blinds, used place mats and napkins, dirty items, or items used by pets (however, we will take any cloth items if they are bagged separately and are labeled "Recycle", which we will sell to a fabric recycler.

GENERAL COMPUTER TOPICS YEAR IN REVIEW By Dean Lotito

I thought the end of the year was a good time to review best practices for computers, phones, and tablets. I hope you find them helpful.

First and foremost are passwords. You should have a different password for every online account. These passwords must be long and complex with letters, numbers, and symbols. Since no one can remember all the passwords they have, a Password Manager is highly recommended. These managers encrypt and securely store your passwords for you. Browsers like Chrome, Edge, Safari, and Firefox are better than writing down passwords, but less secure than password managers. Two of the most reliable computer websites recommend BitWarden, Dashlane, 1Password, Keeper, and NordPass. Some have free versions; others have a range of yearly costs. BitWarden has a good free version.

Using open unsecured networks for shopping or banking is not recommended. Examples of an open unsecure network would include airports, hotels, and most public buildings. This includes doctor's offices and hospitals! And, your home network should use a password and encryption. This will protect your personal information.

Quick things to try when a new problem shows up: The first step any user should take when they are having a new problem is to power down and then restart their device. Be sure to save any open documents before you turn off your device. If the device is powered by a plug, remove the plug for 10 seconds after powering down the device. Then plug it back in and restart. This applies to computers, phones, home routers, and any device that attaches to your home Wi-Fi.

Installing new system updates to computers, phones, and tablets is also best practice. This does not mean you have to be the first person to install an update as soon as it is available some people prefer to wait a few weeks in case there is a problem with the new software that needs to be fixed by the company. However, many of these updates do fix security issues that can be exploited by people trying to steal your money or identity, so they are important for you to install. Keeping your devices updated is the key to protecting your device from hackers and thieves.

Even with the most recent updates, you should never click on a link in an email unless you know the sender is a friend or reputable vendor. And never give personal information by text, email, or phone. Specifically, no one should ever ask for your social security number, credit card number, or bank information. And obviously, never reveal your online passwords. If you need any assistance or have any questions, I'd be happy to help. Have a safe and healthy holiday season!



FINANCIAL FOCUS[®] Know the key benefits of Roth IRA

As you save for retirement, you'll want to take full advantage of the investment vehicles available to you — and one of the best is a Roth IRA. But what sets it apart from other accounts? Three key factors distinguish the Roth IRA:

• *Tax-free earnings* – When you invest in a Roth IRA, your earnings can grow tax free, provided you don't begin taking withdrawals until you're 59½ and you've had your account at least five years. If you don't meet these criteria, withdrawals of earnings will be subject to taxes and a possible 10% penalty.

• No penalties on withdrawals of contributions – You fund a Roth IRA with after-tax dollars, which means you can withdraw your contributions — not the earnings — at any time for any reason, without facing taxes or penalties. So, you could use some of your Roth IRA money for non-retirement purposes, such as helping pay for a child's college education.

• *No required withdrawals at age* 73 – With a traditional IRA or a 401(k), you must start taking withdrawals — called required minimum distributions, or RMDs — once you reach 73. But this rule doesn't apply to a Roth IRA — you can keep it intact as long as you like. You may need to tap into it for some of your retirement income, but if you don't use it all, the remainder could benefit your beneficiaries.

A Roth IRA does share one similarity to a traditional IRA: It can be funded with virtually any type of investment, including stocks, bonds, mutual funds, certificates of deposit (CDs) and so on.

However, unlike a traditional IRA, a Roth IRA does have income limits.

For the 2023 tax year, if your modified adjusted gross income was less than \$138,000 (for a single filer) or \$218,000 (married filing jointly), you can put in the full amount of \$6,500 and an additional \$1,000 catch-up contribution if you're 50 or older. The amounts you can contribute will gradually decline at higher income levels and are phased out entirely at \$153,000 for single filers and \$228,000 if you're married and file jointly. These income ranges will likely change for the 2024 tax year, so you'll want to consult with your tax advisor for details.

Still, even if you've contributed to a traditional IRA or a 401(k) for many years, you may have a chance to eventually "convert" some, or all, of these funds to a Roth IRA and gain its benefits. It's not hard to do this conversion — it involves minimal paperwork from your traditional IRA or 401(k) provider — but it does come with tax issues. Any money that's converted from a traditional IRA or 401(k) to a Roth IRA will be treated as ordinary taxable income. This can trigger a large tax bill, so, unless you have the money available from other accounts to pay the taxes, the conversion may or may not make sense for you. But you don't have to convert all the funds at once. By spreading the conversion over several years, you could reduce the effect of a large tax hit in any single year. You may want to consult with your tax advisor before converting any funds to a Roth IRA.

If you can find a way to contribute to a Roth IRA, either directly or through a conversion, consider it carefully — you'll find a lot of upsides to this investment account.
