The 2024 permit fee has been waved.

Burn Permit Hotline: 1-855-933-4499

Call this number daily, once you have your permit to check if conditions are okay to burn on that day.

You must follow all the rules and regulations that are listed below.

Rules and Regulations

1. You can only burn brush and garden trimmings only.

 Burning is allowed only between 10am and 4pm. No fire shall be started after 12 noon and all fires must be extinguished by 4pm.
 The permit holder must call the Fire Department @ 978-649-6661 each day after 9am for permission to burn that day.

4. The fire must not be left unattended and must be at least 75 feet from any structure.

5. Have available water supply, rakes, shovels, etc. for controlling the fire.

Under all Circumstances the following are prohibited

1. The burning of Grass, Hay, Leaves, Stumps, tires and/or building materials.

2. Burning of brush, trees, cane and/or driftwood from commercial and/or institutional land clearing operations.

3. Burning at landfills or refuse disposal facilities other than approved incinerators.

4. Large piles that will not readily burn or are of such size that they will not be totally out by 4pm.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION The Rain Barrel Program is back!

Become part of the solution by ordering your own rain barrel. Climate crisis is intensifying the water cycle, making wet periods wetter and dry periods drier. Severe droughts can make both rainfall and flash flooding more severe, creating weather whiplash events. When heavy rain falls over drought-stricken soils - which is often hard and cracked - it cannot soak into the ground, and becomes runoff. Rain barrels can collect that runoff and repurpose the collected water.

Tyngsborough, Dunstable and Pepperell are collaborating again to provide residents the opportunity to buy their own rain barrels through The Great American Rain Barrel Company.

MEDICARE 2024 POSITIVE CHANGES FOR SENIORS By Edward H. Adamsky

More than 65 million seniors across the country benefit from Medicare, a government health insurance program. At age 65, you automatically become eligible. You do not have to wait until you retire, in fact, you must apply when reaching age 65. Use the government website **ssa.gov** (oddly you apply through the Social Security website, not the Medicare website). If you just do a search online for Medicare enrollment, be wary of links and sites that are frauds or are just trying to get you to sign up with them for insurance. Make sure you have gone to the official government website. You can enroll in Medicare beginning three months prior to your 65th birthday, during your month of birth, or the following three months. Sometimes you can qualify for Medicare sooner if you have a permanent disability or suffer from end-stage renal disease or certain other conditions.

In 2024 there are several positive changes. Mental Health coverage is expanding. There are about 400,000 more providers that are eligible to take Medicare including marriage and family therapists and mental health counselors. Medicare can now help pay for substance abuse treatment and outpatient mental health care for qualifying patients.

The Medicare Extra Help program has been expanded too. Extra Help assists low-income seniors and people with disabilities. Many who are eligible do not currently participate in the program, sometimes because they don't even know about it. Medicare is going to try reaching out to more eligible people and getting them signed up for Extra Help, which lowers premiums and deductibles for those eligible.

Part D, prescription insurance is going to cut costs for some. Those who rely on certain expensive medications which are not fully covered will have a reduction on their out-of-pocket expenses. If they cost you more than \$8,000 out of pocket, you will not be responsible for any other co-pays or coinsurance for the remainder of the calendar year. This is because Medicare Part D enrollees, as of 2024, will no longer have to pay a 5 percent co-pay for catastrophic coverage.

Insulin and supplies covered by Medicare will be capped at a \$35 per month cost to the patient. The deductibles for supplies have been eliminated as well. The cost of insulin and supplies has tripled over the last decade. The Inflation Reduction Act put these new limits in place. Those who need insulin should see substantial savings this year.

For the first time ever, people receiving Medicare with persistent or recurring pain can have such services has medication management and pain assessment covered by their plan. (You will still need to pay for your Medicare Part B deductible and coinsurance.)

• February 17 - Horse by Geraldine Brooks

Kentucky, 1850. An enslaved groom named Jarret and a bay foal forge a bond of understanding that will carry the horse to recordsetting victories across the South. When the nation erupts in civil war, an itinerant young artist who has made his name on paintings of the racehorse takes up arms for the Union. On a perilous night, he reunites with the stallion and his groom, very far from the glamor of any racetrack. Based on the remarkable true story of the record-breaking thoroughbred Lexington, *Horse* is a novel of art and science, love and obsession, and our unfinished reckoning with racism.

• March 16 - Lessons in Chemistry by Bonnie Garmus

Lessons in Chemistry is about women's lives, careers, and struggle for empowerment in the late 50s and early 60s. It follows the story of <u>Elizabeth Zott</u>, a brilliant chemist who is forced to become a television chef when she finds herself a young, single mother.

ATTENTION 2024 HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES RESIDING IN DUNSTABLE

Congratulations on your pending graduation! We are delighted to announce the availability of the **Helene Morgan Babcock and Alfred Babcock Memorial Scholarship**, and invite you to apply for these generous funds as you continue your education.

During the winter of 1923, the home of the Morgan family here in town caught fire and was largely destroyed. The citizens of our community responded to the crisis by taking in the children (all 17 of them!), keeping the family together and aiding in the reconstruction of their home. One of the children, Helene Morgan Babcock, remembered the words of her mother, "Never forget the kindness of the people of Dunstable," and so established a scholarship fund to be made available to the graduating students of Dunstable as they continue their education.

The amounts of these grants are substantial, with one of the Babcock Scholars receiving \$4,000 each year for up to four years of full-time study. A number of additional \$2,000 scholarships are granted to other students on a one-time basis (the main scholarship is for 4 year full-time studies only).

Additionally, Dunstable's Commissioners of Trust Funds authorized the Babcock Scholarship Committee to award the Russell G. and Shirley L. Tobey Scholarship, which is a onetime award of \$1,000. Applicants applying for the Babcock Scholarship will be automatically considered for the Tobey Scholarship; there is no additional application required. The Tobey Scholarship recipient will be chosen using the Babcock Scholarship selection criteria.

Scholarships may be applied to expenses incurred in the pursuit of advanced education beyond the secondary level in two or four year institutions, vocational education institutions, or formalized apprenticeship programs.





CLOUD STORAGE EXPLAINED By Dean Lotito

These days, all our cell phones, personal computers, MACs, and Chrome Books talk about Cloud Storage. I'll try to explain what this means, and the various options available to utilize Cloud Storage.

Simply stated, when a company such as Apple (iCloud), Google (Google Drive), or Microsoft (OneDrive) offers you cloud storage, they are offering you space to store your documents, pictures, and other computer files. This space physically exists inside their huge data centers located around the world. Cloud storage from these companies offers safe secure storage at a reasonable price. They all offer a small amount of storage for free, and then offer upgrades to more storage for a monthly fee.

All three vendors do a great job integrating with their own phones or personal computers. Apple iCloud works great with iPhones and MACs. Google Drive works best with Android phones and Chrome Books. Microsoft One Drive works great on PCs, and there is an App available to sync well with all cell phones. Also, Apple does offer an App for Microsoft PCS for improved iCloud support.

If you only have one personal device, or all of your devices are from the same vendor, I recommend using the Cloud service from that same vendor. If you have devices from different vendors, you should experiment with the different free offerings to find the best option for you.

If you don't think you need to worry about Cloud storage, think about this: Consider all the pictures you have accumulated on your phone and computer over the years. I'm sure you'd hate to permanently lose those pictures because of the device's hardware failure. Cloud storage ensures that you'll be able to re-download those pictures once your phone or computer is up and running again.

As always, I am available to help you evaluate your cloud storage needs and set up your devices with the service that is best for you.

<u>FINANCIAL FOCUS®</u> HOW CAN WOMEN BRIDGE THE "RETIREMENT GAP"?

March 8 is International Women's Day, a day for celebrating all the accomplishments of women around the globe. But many women still need to make up ground in one key area: retirement security.

Women's challenges in achieving a secure retirement are due to several factors, including these:

• **Pay gap** – It's smaller than it once was, but a wage gap still exists between men and women. In fact, women earn, on average, about 82 cents for every dollar that men earn, according to the Census Bureau. And even though this gap narrows considerably at higher educational levels, it's still a source of concern. Women who earn less than men will likely contribute less to 401(k) plans and will ultimately see smaller Social Security checks.

Longer lives – At age 65, women live, on average, about 20 more years, compared to almost 17 for men, according to the Social Security Administration. Those extra years mean extra expenses.
Caregiving responsibilities – Traditionally, women have done much of the caregiving for young children and older parents. And while this caregiving is done with love, it also comes with financial sacrifice. Consider this: The average employment-related costs for mothers providing unpaid care is nearly \$300,000 over a lifetime, according to the U.S. Department of Labor — which translates to a reduction of 15% of lifetime earnings. Furthermore, time away from the workforce results in fewer contributions to 401(k) and other employer-sponsored retirement plans.

Ultimately, these issues can leave women with a retirement security deficit. Here are some moves that can help close this gap: • **Contribute as much as possible to retirement plans**. Try to contribute as much as you can afford to your 401(k) or similar employer-sponsored retirement plan. Your earnings can grow tax deferred and your contributions can lower your taxable income. (With a Roth 401(k), contributions aren't deductible, but earnings and withdrawals are tax free, provided you meet certain conditions.) At a minimum, contribute enough to earn your employer's matching contribution, if one is offered, and try to boost your contributions whenever your salary goes up. If you don't have access to a 401(k), but you have earned income, you can contribute to an IRA. Even if you don't have earned income, but you have a spouse who does, you might be eligible to contribute to a spousal IRA.

• Maximize Social Security benefits. You can start taking Social Security at 62, but your monthly checks will be much bigger if you can afford to wait until your full retirement age, which will be around 66½. If you are married, you may want to coordinate your benefits with those of your spouse — in some cases, it makes sense for the spouse with the lower benefits to claim first, based on their earnings record, and apply for spousal benefits later, when the spouse with higher benefits begins to collect.

• Build an emergency fund. Try to build an emergency fund containing up to six months' worth of living expenses, with the money kept in a liquid account. Having this fund available will help protect you from having to dip into your retirement accounts for large, unexpected costs, such as a major home or car repair.

It's unfortunate, but women still must travel a more difficult road than men to reach retirement security. But making the right moves can help ease the journey.






STITCHERS AT THE TYNGSBORO SENIOR CENTER
