MEDICARE OPEN ENROLLMENT By Edward H. Adamsky

Medicare open enrollment is here. From October 15 through December 7, you can make any changes you want to your coverage. Those changes will take effect on the first of next year. There are new laws governing health insurance, so you should investigate carefully to see if you want to make any changes.

You can switch between Medicare Advantage plans. Or if you are in an Advantage plan and don't like it, you can switch back to traditional Medicare. If you are in traditional Medicare you can move to an Advantage Plan, or if you are staying with traditional Medicare, you can switch your Part D (prescription) plan. If you are in an Advantage plan now, you also have an additional period of January 1 to March 31 of next year when you can switch or drop your plan. With the new laws some Advantage plans are changing significantly, or may even be dropped, so you may have to make a change.


Be sure to contact your doctors to make sure they take your plan and if you are going to change, make sure they take the one you are planning to go to. Many Advantage plans have no premium which can seem tempting (along with the extra benefits they provide) but you may want to review all of the plans carefully, even if they have a premium, to see what is best for you.

The Inflation Reduction Act may mean that you will see lower prices for your prescription drugs in the coming years. But this might mean that some Part D plans will increase their premiums. The Government plans to take steps to stop this and has capped the price increase that carriers can charge to \$35 for next year. Still, this may mean changes in the future, so your plan might go away or change. Keep an eye out for any mailings from your insurance company.

You will have a yearly cap on prescription drugs of \$2000 for 2025, so that should reduce costs for some people. Those with fairly expensive prescriptions now may find that they will save a lot next year. Those on insulin will find their costs capped at \$35 per month. (That cap doesn't include some related items). Again, check the plan options and compare their drug formulary (the ones they cover) to make sure your prescriptions are covered by the plan you choose.

There is a program called Extra Help that can pay for some of your premiums if you qualify. It is a low-income program, but the limit has been increased to 150 percent of the Federal Poverty Level. Look into the program and apply if you are eligible.

Contact your insurance broker, if you use one, your Elder Law Attorney, or go online to Medicare.gov to find many handouts and informational articles about open enrollment and choosing a health insurance plan for next year. And do it now!

I have some GREAT news for all of you Veterans and families. I met with Mass VA Secretary Jon Santiago recently, and he noted some wonderful news for all of us. He is introducing to our State Congress an Act Honoring, Empowering, and Recognizing Our Servicemembers and Veterans (The HERO Act) which includes over 30 Spending and policy initiatives, tax credits, and statute changes organized into four buckets: Benefit Expansion, Commitment to Inclusion and greater representation, Modernization of Veteran Services, and Honoring/Recognizing our Veterans. One thing that is very important to you out there who are struggling to make ends meet is the increase in the Chapter 115 funding. In other words, you who have not been able to qualify for this benefit will now be able to receive it, hopefully sometime this year. If you have any questions, please feel free to contact me.

CURBSIDE LEAF & YARD WASTE COLLECTION

Black Earth Compost will be offering a Leaf and Yard Waste Collection this fall to Dunstable residents. If you're interested in this service, here are the details: Residents purchase their own 30 Gallon Paper Leaf Bags (no plastic bags). Leaf and Yard Waste is defined as leaves, weeds, small plants, brush, and sticks smaller than half an inch in diameter. Grass clippings are also accepted, but only if pesticides/herbicides have not been used. Sign up directly with Black Earth Compost through their website https://.blackearthcompost.com/create-account/ Simply add your address, chose Yard Waste Removal, and complete your order. Leaf and yard waste should be placed in the standard paper leaf bags and on the curb by 6am of pickup date. Pickup will be the week of November **11, 2024.** There will be more information on your pickup date when you sign up. Pricing: First 3 Bag Pickup =\$18. Each additional set of 3 bags = \$12. Residents who are interested in curbside collection of food waste can preregister at the website. They accept meat, dairy, bones and BPI compostable serviceware. Once there is enough interest, Black Earth can start a route. At this time residents would also have access to year round leaf and yard waste collections. https://.blackearthcompost.com/create-account/

Matt's Monthly Mechanical Memo

Let's explore some of the factors behind why we see higher amounts of water heater failures as outside temperatures drop.

Water coming into and exiting the water heater will be affected by the external temperatures, causing the heater to work harder during colder months. Location matters. Often installed in colder areas, such as unfinished basements or a garage, means the unit needs to work overtime to raise and maintain water temperatures.

Age of the unit. Older tanks with large amounts of sediment build-up and corroded anode rods are more likely to fail under heavier stress. Finally, hot water demands go up when it's cold outside. We use more and hotter water for things like showers, baths and dishes when it's chilly outside.

Annual check-ups by a professional plumber can help avoid unexpected breakdowns. Until next month, stay comfortable.

STONE WALLS AND SCENIC ROADS

Refer to Massachusetts General Laws, Title VII, Chapter 40, Section 15C: Scenic road designations; improvements; fines: <u>https://malegislature.gov/Laws/GeneralLaws/PartI/TitleVII/</u> <u>Chapter40/Section15C</u>

The stone walls lining many roads and tracing through the woods and fields of Dunstable date mostly from the 18th and 19th centuries. They were built to get rid of stones from our glacier-impacted soils and were used for controlling livestock and, increasingly, as boundary markers. (A split rail fence – one rail set upon crossed fence posts – might be added, supplemented, or replaced by barbed wire after the 1870s.)

Although at first glance the stone walls may appear to some people to be just a pile of rocks, in keeping with a single theme throughout the town, it is important that we maintain their appearance.

These walls have historical and aesthetic value and are legally protected in some locations. One may not alter a "bound wall" – one that forms a boundary between two separately owned properties. In Dunstable and many other towns, walls bordering roads designated as "scenic" by Town Meeting may not be breached, significantly altered, or demolished without permission from the Planning Board after a public hearing. (Refer to the Town's General Bylaws, and subsection "SCENIC ROAD BYLAW" for a listing of designated scenic roads.) Breaching a wall – most often to accommodate a new driveway – is rather straightforward but does require a permit. Repairing or reconstructing a wall involves several considerations.

Stone walls have two natural enemies: vegetation and gravity. Dunstable farmers created stone walls and had to maintain them (sometimes called "mending walls.") This typically simply meant restoring to their place stones which had fallen or rebuilding a collapsed portion. Such repair is certainly permitted by the Town's Scenic Roads Bylaw. (Note: Dunstable's historic walls were always "dry" – NO mortar should ever be used in repairing them.) Adding new stones to a wall is another matter. Stones exposed to the elements or "weathered" are gray and often covered with various species of moss and lichens, a process that takes decades. "Raw" stone (i.e., covered by earth until now) stands out for years and should be used sparingly or not at all. On the other hand, some roadside walls get partly buried; it's OK to re-expose the stones. Sometimes one can use nearby stretches of a wall as a guide for height and style, whether mending an existing wall or building a new one where none exists.



Take advantage of open enrollment

If you work for a midsize or large company, you may soon be able to review your employee benefits package, as we are entering the open enrollment season. So, consider your options carefully, with an eye toward making changes appropriate for your needs.

Here are some of the key areas to look at: • Retirement plan – Depending on your employer, you could

change your 401(k) or similar retirement plan at any time of the year, but you might want to use the open enrollment season to review your contribution amounts. If your salary has gone up over the past year, you might want to boost your pre-tax contributions (including catch-up contributions beginning at age 50). At a minimum, try to put in at least enough to earn your employer's match, if one is offered. At the same time, look over how your contributions are allocated among the various investment options in your plan. You'll want your investment mix to reflect your goals, risk tolerance and time horizon.

• *Life insurance* – If your employer offers group life insurance at no cost as an employee benefit, you may want to take it – but be aware that it might not be enough to fully protect your family should anything happen to you. You may have heard that you need about seven to 10 times your annual income as a life insurance death benefit, but there's really no one right answer for everyone. Instead, you should evaluate various factors — including your mortgage, your income, your spouse's income (if applicable), your liabilities, the number of years until your retirement, number of children and their future educational needs — to determine how much insurance you need. If your employer's group policy seems insufficient, you may want to consider adding some outside overage.

• Disability insurance – Your employer may offer no-cost group disability insurance, but as is the case with life insurance, it might not be sufficient to adequately protect your income in case you become temporarily or permanently disabled. In fact, many employer-sponsored disability plans only cover a short period, such as five years, so to gain longer coverage up to age 65, you may want to look for a separate personal policy. Disability policies vary widely in premium costs and benefits, so you'll want to do some comparison shopping with several insurance companies.

• Flexible spending account – A flexible spending account (FSA) lets you contribute up to \$3,200 pre-tax dollars to pay for some out-of-pocket medical costs, such as prescriptions and insurance copayments and deductibles. You decide how much you want to put into your FSA, up to the 2025 limit. You generally must use up the funds in your FSA by the end of the calendar year, but your employer may grant you an extension of 2½ months or allow you to carry over up to \$640.

• *Health savings account* – Like an FSA, a health savings account (HSA) lets you use pre-tax dollars to pay out-of-pocket medical costs. Unlike an FSA, though, your unused HSA contributions will carry over to the next year. Also, an HSA allows you take withdrawals, though they may be assessed a 10% penalty. To contribute to an HSA, you need to participate in a high-deductible health insurance plan.

Make the most of your benefits package — it can be a big part of your overall financial picture.

SHARING FILES FROM YOUR WINDOWS PC TO YOUR CELL PHONE By Dean Lotito

Have you ever been out of the house and wishing that you had access to a file or picture stored on your Windows PC at home? This feature is available now. Microsoft has the OneDrive App for both Android AND Apple iPhone to give you instant access to files on that home PC. You can open a document using your phone, and even edit it. When you get back home, the revised document will reflect all the changes made on your phone. You will need a version of the same application to edit a document that you use on your PC. These apps are also available for download.

In the Apple App Store and Google Play Store you can search for the OneDrive App from Microsoft. Once the app is loaded, you will need to log in using the same Microsoft account that you use on your Windows PC. Once you are logged in, the documents folder on your PC will be available on your Apple or Android phone.

It is required that the documents folder on your PC be under the OneDrive directory. This is the default setting when windows if installed.


